Setting Up Your Phone

- 1. Install the battery.
 - Remove the battery from its packaging.
 - Place your fingernail into the Release Latch indention (adjacent to the microphone) and carefully lift (1) the case off the rear of the phone (2).

 This is similar to popping the top off a soda can.



• Insert the battery into the opening in the back of the phone (3), making sure the connectors align. Gently press down to secure the battery (4).



- Position the battery cover over the battery compartment and press down until you hear a click.
- 2. Press to turn the phone on.
 - If your phone is activated, it will turn on, search for Sprint service, and enter standby mode.

- If your phone is not yet activated, see "Activating Your Phone" on page 3 for more information.
- 3. Make your first call.
 - Use your keypad to enter a phone number.
 - Press

Note: Your phone's battery should have enough charge for your phone to turn on and find a signal, set up your voicemail, and make a call. You should fully charge your battery as soon as possible. See "Charging the Battery" on page 18 for details.

Activating Your Phone

- If you purchased your phone at a Sprint Store, it is probably activated and ready to use.
- If you received your phone in the mail and it is for a new Sprint account or a new line of service, it is designed to activate automatically. To confirm your activation, make a phone call.
- If you received your phone in the mail and you are activating a new phone for an existing number on your account, you will need to go online to activate your new phone.

From your computer's Web browser, go to www.sprint.com/activate and complete the onscreen instructions to activate your phone.

When you have finished, make a phone call to confirm your activation. If your phone is still not activated or you do not have access to the Internet, contact Sprint Customer Service at 1-888-211-4727 for assistance.

Tip: Do not press while the phone is being activated. Pressing cancels the activation process.

Note: If you are having difficulty with activation, contact Sprint Customer Service by dialing 1-888-211-4727 from any other phone.

Setting Up Your Voicemail

Your phone automatically transfers all unanswered calls to your voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off. You should set up your Sprint Voicemail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated. Always use a passcode to protect against unauthorized access.

- 1. From standby mode, press and hold ...
- 2. Follow the system prompts to:
 - Create your passcode.
 - Record your name announcement.
 - Record your greeting.

Note: Voicemail Passcode

Sprint strongly recommends that you create a passcode when setting up your voicemail to protect against unauthorized access. Without a passcode, anyone who has access to your phone is able to access your voicemail messages.

Sprint Account Passwords

As a Sprint customer, you enjoy unlimited access to your personal account information, your voicemail account, and your data services account. To ensure that no one else has access to your information, you will need to create passwords to protect your privacy.

Account Username and Password

If you are the account owner, you will create an account username and password when you sign on to www.sprint.com. (Click Need to register for access? to get started.) If you are not the account owner (if someone else receives the bill for your Sprint service), you can get a sub-account password at www.sprint.com.

Voicemail Password

You'll create your voicemail password (or passcode) when you set up your voicemail. See "Setting Up Your Voicemail" on page 4 for more information on your voicemail password.

Data Services Password

With your Sprint phone, you may elect to set up an optional data services password to control access and authorize Premium Service purchases.

Your Phone



Key Functions

- Front Indicator Light (LED) shows your phone's connection status at a glance.
- Status Bar Icons provide information about your phone's status and options, such as signal strength, roaming, ringer setting, messaging, and battery charge.
- Display Screen displays all the information needed to operate your phone, such as the call status, the Contacts list, the date and time, and the signal and battery strength.
- Navigation Key (similar to an optical joystick) uses touch to scroll through the phone's menu options. Pressing it accepts an onscreen selection.
- Softkeys Portrait Mode let you select left and right softkey actions or menu items corresponding to the bottom left and bottom right lines on the Display Screen when the phone is in portrait mode.
- SPEAKER Key lets you place or receive calls in speakerphone mode.

- TALK Key () allows you to place or receive calls, answer Call Waiting, use 3-Way Calling, or activate Voice Dial.
- Keypad lets you enter numbers, letters, and characters, and navigate within menus. Press and hold keys for speed dialing.
- Microphone allows other callers to hear you clearly when you are speaking to them.
- 10. END/POWER Key () lets you turn the phone on or off, end a call, or return to standby mode. While in the main menu, it returns the phone to standby mode and cancels your input. When you receive an incoming call, press to enter silent mode and mute the ringer.
- 11. BACK/Clear Key deletes characters from the display in text entry mode. When in a menu, pressing the Back key () returns you to the previous menu. This key also allows you to return to the previous screen in a data session.
- MENU/OK lets you access the phone's menus and selects the highlighted choice when navigating through a menu.

- Earpiece lets you hear the caller and automated prompts.
- 14. Charger/Accessory Jack allows you to connect the phone charger or an optional USB cable. CAUTION! Inserting an accessory into the incorrect jack may damage the phone.
- 15. Volume Button allows you to adjust the ringer volume in standby mode (with the phone open) or adjust the voice volume during a call. The volume button can also be used to scroll up or down to navigate through the different menu options.
- microSD Card (internal) lets you use a microSD card to expand the memory of your phone. To gain access to this slot, you must first remove the battery cover.
- Cover Release Latch lets you remove the battery cover and expose both the internal battery compartment and internal microSD card slot.
- Camera Button lets you activate the camera and camcorder and take pictures and videos.

- Headset Jack allows you to plug in either a stereo headset or an optional headset for convenient, hands-free conversations.
 CAUTION! Inserting an accessory into the incorrect iack may damage the phone.
- Camera Lens, as part of the built-in camera, lets you take pictures and videos.

Landscape Phone Features



- 21. Softkeys Landscape Mode let you select left and right softkey actions or menu items corresponding to the bottom left and bottom right lines on the Display Screen when the phone is in landscape mode.
- QWERTY Keyboard provides an alphanumeric character keyboard layout.
- 23. Shift Key lets you toggle alphabet characters between mixed case, uppercase and lowercase. Character case remains as selected until the Shift key is pressed again.
- FN Key (Function) key, toggles to access the white numbers/symbols on the QWERTY keyboard.
- Text Key launches the New Text Message menu from where you can initiate a new outgoing text message.
- Space Key lets you add spaces between words and characters.
- Enter/OK Key lets you perform the function highlighted in the current menu. Press to enter additional lines of text.

28. Back Key deletes characters from the display in text entry mode. When in a menu, pressing returns you to the previous menu. This key also allows you to return to the previous screen in a data session.

Self Timer - The self-timer function is enabled.



White Balance (Auto) – The white balance has been set to Automatic. This is used for taking pictures indoors or outdoors using automatic white balance settings.



White Balance (Daylight) – The white balance has been set to Sunny. This is used for taking pictures or movies outdoors on bright sunny days.



White Balance (Cloudy) – The white balance has been set to Cloudy. This is used for taking pictures or movies outdoors under cloudy conditions.



White Balance (Incandescent) – The white balance has been set to Tungsten. This is used for taking pictures or movies indoors under normal lighting conditions.



White Balance (Fluorescent) – The white balance has been set to Fluorescent. This is used for taking pictures or movies indoors under fluorescent lighting conditions.

Status Bar - Other Icons



White Balance (Manual) – The white balance has been set to Manual. This is used for taking pictures indoors or outdoors using your own custom settings.



Recording – A video or voice memo is currently being recorded.



Paused- A voice memo or video has been paused.



Play – A a voice memo or video is playing.



Media Upload – Files have been uploaded to an online album or folder.

Voice Caption – Voice captioning is enabled and



that audio is currently being recorded.

Bluetooth (Enabled/Active) – The Bluetooth

technology is active and enabled.



Bluetooth (Connected) – The Bluetooth device is connected



Bluetooth (Headset Connected) – The Bluetooth Headset is connected and visible.

Status Bar - Other Icons



Bluetooth (Stereo Connected) – The Bluetooth stereo device is connected and visible.



Bluetooth (Hidden) – The device is hidden to other Bluetooth devices and not transmitting its information.



Background Application +1 – Indicates that more than one application is currently running and one has been minimized and placed in the background.



Wireless Backup – A current wireless backup session is in progress.

Turning Your Phone On and Off

Turning Your Phone On

Press and hold for two seconds.

Once your phone is on, it may display "Searching for Service." When your phone finds a signal, it enters standby mode – the phone's idle state. At this point, you are ready to begin making and receiving calls.

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. When a signal is found, your phone automatically returns to standby mode.

In Power Save mode, your phone searches for a signal periodically without your intervention. You can also initiate a search for Sprint service by pressing any key (when your phone is turned on).

Tip: The Power Save feature conserves your battery power when you are in an area where there is no signal.

Turning Your Phone Off

Press and hold for two seconds until you see the powering-down animation on the display screen.

Your screen remains blank while your phone is off (unless the battery is charging).

Battery and Charger

WARNING: Use only Sprint-approved os Samsungapproved batteries and chargers with your phone. The failure to use a Sprint-approved or Samsung-approved battery and charger may increase the risk that your phone will overheat, catch fire, or explode, resulting in serious bodily injury, death, or property damage.

Battery Capacity

Your phone is equipped with a Lithium Ion (Li-Ion) battery. It allows you to recharge your battery before it is fully drained. The battery provides up to 6.0 hours of continuous digital talk time.

Note: Long backlight settings, searching for service, vibrate mode, browser use, and other variables may reduce the battery's talk and standby times.

Tip: Watch your phone's battery level indicator and charge the battery before it runs out of power.

Removing the Battery

 Make sure the power is off so that you don't lose any stored numbers or messages.

- Place your fingernail into the Release Latch indention (adjacent to the microphone) and carefully lift the case off the rear of the phone.
- 3. Lift the battery up (1) and remove the battery from the phone (2).

WARNING: Do not handle a damaged or leaking Li-lon battery as you can be burned.



4. Position the battery cover over the battery compartment. Align the case over the Battery Latch, then in a single motion, press down and snap the entire case over the compartment until you hear a click.



Press along the entire edge of the cover to verify it is securely in place.

WARNING: Do not handle a damaged or leaking Li-lon battery as you can be burned.

Charging the Battery

Keeping track of your battery's charge is important. If your battery level becomes too low, your phone automatically turns off, and you will lose any information you were just working on.

Always use a Sprint-approved or Samsung-approved desktop charger, travel charger, or vehicle power adapter to charge your battery.

Tip: It is recommended that you completely charge your battery first before using your phone. This guarantees you begin using your phone with a fully charged battery.

Plug the flat end of the charger into the phone's charger jack and the other end into an electrical outlet.



- A red indicator light means the battery is charging.
- A green indicator light means the battery is at least 90 percent charged.
- A battery icon (indicates the current charge level of the internal battery.

With the Sprint-approved Li-lon battery, you can recharge the battery before it becomes completely run down.

Navigating Through the Menus


Note: Your phone's Sprint One Click main screen gives you instant access to your favorite features. See section 2B "Navigating the Main Screen" on page 42 for complete information.

Menu navigation can be accomplished via either the touch-sensitive navigation key or via the directional keys on the QWERTY keyboard.

The navigation key on your phone lets you scroll through and select onscreen items. Many menus feature a scroll bar on the right to help you keep track of your position in the menu.

For a diagram of your phone's menu, please see "Your Phone's Menu" on page i.

Selecting Menu Items Using the Navigation Key



The navigation key acts as a dual touch-sensitive mouse and OK/Enter key. As you navigate through a menu, options are highlighted. Select any option by highlighting it and pressing ...

If the option is numbered, you can also select it by pressing the corresponding number on the phone's keypad.

For example, to view your text messages:

- From standby mode, scroll left or right to highlight and then press to access the main menu.
- Scroll across the navigation key until Messages is highlighted and press
- Select Messages by highlighting it and then pressing (If you have any text messages, they are displayed.)

For the purposes of this guide, the above steps condense into:

► Highlight and press > Messages > Messages.

Selecting Menu Items Using the Arrow Keys

As you navigate through a menu, options are highlighted. Select any option by pressing a directional arrow from the QWERTY keyboard and moving the onscreen selection, highlighting it and pressing [Enter].

If the option is numbered, you can select it by pressing the corresponding number on the phone's keypad.

For example, to view your text messages:

- 1. From standby mode, press the left or right directional keys to highlight and then press to access the main menu.
- Press these keys and select Messages by highlighting it and pressing

Making and Answering Calls

Making Calls

- 1. Enter a phone number from standby mode. (If you make a mistake while dialing, press to erase the numbers.)
- 2. Press (To make a call when you are roaming and Call Guard is enabled, press and press See "Call Guard" on page 125.)
- 3. Press when you are finished.

Tip: To redial your last outgoing call, press twice.

To redial other recent numbers, press highlight a number, and press again.

When making calls off the Nationwide Sprint Network, always dial using 11 digits (1 + area code + phone number).

You can also place calls from your phone by speed dialing numbers from your Contacts (page 30) and using your History listings (page 64).

Dialing Options

When you enter numbers in standby mode, you will see a variety of dialing options displayed as softkeys on the phone's screen.

To send a message to the number, press **SEND MESSAGE** (left softkey).

- or -

To initiate an option, press **OPTIONS** (right softkey), then press the corresponding softkey.

 Contact Details: Displays the details for a Contact if the entered number matches a previously created entry.

Tip: To speed dial a phone number from standby mode, press and hold the speed dial number. If the speed dial number is two digits, enter the first digit, and then press and hold the second digit. (For information on setting up speed dial numbers, see "Assigning Speed Dial Numbers" on page 70.) (This feature will not work when you are roaming off the Nationwide Sprint Network; when roaming you must dial using eleven digits [1 + the area code + the seven-digit phone number].)

- Save Contact: Allows you to save the phone number in your Contacts. (See "Saving a Phone Number" on page 27.)
- Hard Pause: Enter digits and then use this feature to enter a hard pause within a number string (the phone waits for your input). To continue dialing, you must press
 (See "Dialing and Saving Phone Numbers With Pauses" on page 28.)
- 2-Sec Pause: Enter digits and then use this feature to enter a 2 second delay within a number string (the phone continues dialing after 2 seconds without any additional keys being pressed). (See "Dialing and Saving Phone Numbers With Pauses" on page 28.)

Answering Calls

- Make sure your phone is on. (If your phone is off, incoming calls go to voicemail.)
- Press to answer an incoming call. (Depending on your settings, you may also answer incoming calls by opening the phone or by pressing any number key.)

Your phone notifies you of incoming calls in the following ways:

- The phone rings or vibrates.
- The indicator light flashes.
- The backlight illuminates.
- The screen displays an incoming call message.

If the incoming call is from a number stored in your Contacts, the entry's name is displayed. You may also see the caller's phone number, if available.

Answering a Roam Call With Call Guard Enabled

Call Guard is an option that helps you manage your roaming charges when making or receiving calls while outside the Nationwide Sprint Network. Please see "Roaming" on page 123 for more information about roaming.

 Select ANSWER to answer the call. (See "Call Guard" on page 125 for additional information.)

Note: When your phone is off, calls go directly to voicemail

Missed Call Notification

When you do not answer an incoming call, your screen displays the Missed Alerts Call log.

To display the Missed Call entry from the notification screen:

Highlight the entry and press . (To dial the phone number, press .)

To display a Missed Call entry from standby mode:

- 1. Highlight and press > History.
- 2. Highlight an entry and press .

Calling Emergency Numbers

You can place calls to 911 by dialing (1997), even if your phone is locked or your account is restricted.

Note: When you place an emergency call, your phone automatically enters Emergency mode.

During an emergency call, press **OPTIONS** (right softkey) to display your options. Highlight an option and press ...

- Speaker On to activate speakerphone mode. (If you are in speakerphone mode, the option is displayed as Speaker Off to deactivate.)
- Unlock Phone to unlock your phone (appears only if the phone is locked).
- Close Menu to close the pop-up menu (appears only if the phone is unlocked).

Tip: Press My Phone (left softkey) to display your phone number during an emergency call.

To exit Emergency mode:

1. Press until Emergency mode is exited.

Note: When you are in Emergency mode, you can exit by pressing then pressing ...

To deactivate the Emergency call in standby mode:

▶ Press until Emergency mode is exited.

Enhanced 911 (E911) Information

This phone features an embedded Global Positioning System (GPS) chip necessary for utilizing E911 emergency location services where available.

When you place an emergency 911 call, the GPS feature of your phone seeks information to calculate your approximate location. Depending on several variables, including availability and access to satellite signals, it may take up to 30 seconds or more to determine and report your approximate location.

Important: Always report your location to the 911 operator when placing an emergency call. Some designated emergency call takers, known as Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) may not be equipped to receive GPS location information from your phone.

In-Call Options

Pressing **OPTIONS** (right softkey) during a call displays a list of available in-call features. To select an option, press the corresponding keypad number or highlight the option and press . The following options may be available through the Options menu:

- Contact Details to display Contact information if the number is saved in your Contacts.
- Save to add the new number to your Contacts list.
- 3-way Call to initiate a three-way call. (For more information, see "Making a 3-Way Call" on page 122)
- Contacts to display your Contacts list.
- Voice Memo allows you to record incoming audio from your conversation. (For more information, see "Managing Voice Memos" on page 88.)
- Phone Info displays the following menu options:
 - Phone Number your phone number
 - Icon Glossary a list of currently available icons
 - Version phone software version
 - Advanced additional technical information
- Key Mute/Unmute allows you to mute the key tones from being heard by the caller.
- Messaging accesses the Message menu options.
- Recent History checks your call log for Recent calls.
 You can also erase the logs from this menu.
- Tools accesses the Tools menu options.
 - Calendar your calendar entries

- Bluetooth a list of current Bluetooth devices
- Memo Pad onscreen memo pad
- Alarm your Alarm events and menu
- Calculator onscreen calculator

Press **MUTE** (left softkey) during a call to mute the microphone. Press **UNMUTE** (left softkey) to unmute the microphone.

Using the Speakerphone

To use your phone handsfree or to share a call with other people:

 Place your phone in Speaker Mode by pressing the Speaker key () until "Entering speaker mode" appears in the display.

WARNING: Because of higher volume levels, do not place the phone near your ear during speakerphone use.

2. To disable Speaker Mode, press until "Exit speaker mode" appears in the display.

End-of-Call Options

After you receive a call from or make a call to a phone number that is not in your Contacts, the phone displays the phone number and the duration of the call.

Press OPTIONS (right softkey) > Save to add the new number to your Contacts. (See "Saving a Phone Number" on page 27.)

After you receive a call from or make a call to a phone number that is already in your Contacts, the phone displays the entry name, phone number, and the duration of the call. Press **OPTIONS** (right softkey) > **Contact Details** to view the Contacts listing for the number.

Note: The End-of-Call options are not displayed for calls identified as No ID or Restricted.

Saving a Phone Number

You can store up to 1000 contact entries in total, with each contact entry containing a maximum of seven phone numbers for a total phone book capacity of 7000 numbers. Each entry's name can contain 64 characters. Your phone automatically sorts the Contacts entries alphabetically. (For more information, see "2E. Contacts" on page 66.)

To save a number from standby mode:

- Enter a phone number and press OPTIONS (left softkey) > Save Contact.
- Highlight New Entry or Existing Entry and press
- Highlight a label (Mobile, Home, Work, Pager, Fax, or Other) and press
- 4. Enter the new contact name.

Search for an existing contact name.

Press DONE (left softkey) to save the entry. You are then notified if the number was successfully added.

Finding a Phone Number

You can search Contacts for entries by name.

Dialing and Saving Phone Numbers With Pauses

You can dial or save phone numbers with pauses for use with automated systems, such as voicemail or credit card billing numbers.

There are two types of pauses available on your phone:

- Hard Pause sends the next set of numbers when you press . (This is indicated with a p within the number sequence.)
- 2-Second Pause automatically sends the next set of numbers after two seconds. (This is indicated with a t within the number sequence.)

Note: You can have multiple pauses in a phone number and combine two-second and hard pauses.

To dial or save phone numbers with pauses:

- 1. Enter the phone number.
- Press OPTIONS (right softkey) > Hard Pause or 2-Sec Pause.
- Enter additional numbers.

- 4. Press to dial the number.
 - or -

Press **OPTIONS** (right softkey) > **Save Contact** to save the number in your Contacts.

Note: When dialing a number with a hard pause, press SEND TONES (left softkey) to send the next set of numbers.

Abbreviated Dialing

Abbreviated Dialing is similar to speed dialing. You can use either of the following abbreviated dialing features.

- Contacts Match Retrieve any number saved in your Contacts by entering the last four digits of the number. Press to dial the retrieved number. (See "To activate the Contacts Match feature:" on page 57.)
- Prepend/Abbreviated Dialing Prepend the first five or six digits (for example, the area code and prefix) to any four or five digits you enter. Press to dial the resulting number. (See page 57 to register a prepend number and activate the Prepend feature.)

To place a call using Contacts Match Abbreviated Dialing:

- Enter the last four to six digits of a Contacts entry's phone number.
- Press to call the displayed number. (If there is more than one matched number in your Contacts, your phone displays the Abbrev. Dial list. Highlight a name and then press to place a call.) (See "Finding a Phone Number" on page 27.)

To place a call using Prepend Abbreviated Dialing:

- 1. Enter the last four or five digits of the number.
- 2. Press

Dialing From the Contacts List

Highlight and press > Contacts.

Shortcut: From standby mode, press CONTACTS (right softkey) to list entries.

Highlight the entry you want to call and press to dial the entry's default phone number.

- or -

To dial another number from the entry, highlight the name and press , and then highlight a number and press .

Speed Dialing

You can store up to 99 numbers in your phone's speed dial memory. Dial speed dial entries using one keypress for locations 2–9 or two keypresses for locations 10–99.

To use One-Touch Dialing for speed dial locations 2–9:

Press and hold the appropriate key for approximately two seconds. The display confirms that you have dialed the number when it shows "Calling...".

To use Two-Touch Dialing for speed dial locations 10-99:

1. Press the first digit.

Press and hold the second digit for approximately two seconds. The display confirms that you have dialed the number when it shows "Connecting...".

Plus (+) Code Dialing

When placing international calls, Plus Code Dialing automatically enters the international access code for your location (for example, 011 for international calls made from the U.S.).

- Press and hold until you see a "+" on the display screen.
- Dial the country code and phone number, and then press (The phone automatically prepends the access code for international dialing, followed by the country code and phone number.)

Entering Text in Portrait Mode

Your phone provides convenient ways to enter letters, numbers, and symbols whenever you are prompted to enter text (for example, when adding a Contacts entry or when using Sprint Mail and Text Messaging).

In this section we'll cover the steps necessary to enter text while the phone is in portrait mode where the keypad is the primary method of both text and character entry.

Selecting a Text Input Mode

- From a screen where you can enter text, press
 OPTIONS (right softkey) > Text Mode to change the
 text input mode.
- 2. Select one of the following options:
 - Predictive Text to enter text using a predictive text system that reduces the number of keypresses required while entering a word. (See page 32.)
 - Smiley's to enter "emoticons." (See page 33.)
 - Symbols to enter symbols. (See page 33.)

■ Text Settings to configure these options: Auto-Capital, Auto-Space, Dual Language, Word Choice List, Word Prediction, Word Completion, Use My Words (See "Entering Numbers, Symbols, Smileys and Preset Messages" on page 33.)

Tip: When entering text, press to change letter capitalization (ABC > Abc > abc).

Selecting a Text Message Option

- 1. From a screen where you can enter text, press **OPTIONS** (right softkey).
- 2. Select one of the following options:
 - Add Preset Message to enter preprogrammed messages. (See page 34.)
 - Add/Change Recipients to return to the Send to page and either add or change any previously chosen recipients.
 - Add/Change Attachments to return to the Send to page and either add or change any current attached files. See "Composing Text/Picture Messages" on page 119.

- Add/Change Subject Line to return to the Send to page and either add or change the message subject text.
- Save as Draft to store the current message as a draft for later modification and delivery.
- Mark as Urgent to set a priority level of Urgent to the outgoing message. This notifies any recipient of the urgent read status for the outgoing message.
- Set Callback # to set the callback number seen by text message recipients.

For complete information on text messaging, see "Messaging (SMS/MMS)" on page 119.

Entering Text Using Predictive Text

Predictive Text lets you enter text by pressing keys just once per letter. (To select this mode when entering text, see "Selecting a Text Input Mode" on page 31.) This input method uses an intuitive word database to analyze the letters you enter and create a suitable word. (The word may change as you type.)

- From a screen where you can enter text, press
 OPTIONS (right softkey) > Text Mode > Predictive
 Text > On to activate this input mode.
- Press the corresponding keys once per letter to enter a word. (For example, to enter the word "Bill," press) (If you make a mistake, press to erase a single character. Press and hold to erase all previously entered text.)

ABC Mode

In its default mode, also known as ABC or multi-tap entry, you press keys one, two, three, or four times to enter the letters you see on the keypad. For example, press once for "a," twice for "b", or three times for "c"; or press once for "p," twice for "q," three times for "r," or four times for "s."

1. Press the corresponding keys repeatedly until the correct letter appears. (For example, to enter the word "Bill," press twice, three times, and three times, and sixth three times again.) (If you make a mistake, press a single character. Press and hold to erase an entire word.)

By default, the first letter of an entry is capitalized and the following letters are lowercased. After a character is entered, the cursor automatically advances to the next space after two seconds or when you enter a character on a different key.

Entering Numbers, Symbols, Smileys and Preset Messages

To enter numbers:

▶ Press the corresponding keys repeatedly until the correct number appears. Pressing a key multiple times cycles the characters through its available set. Pressing four times displays the number two. (See "Selecting a Text Input Mode" on page 31.)

To enter symbols:

- From a screen where you can enter text, press
 OPTIONS (right softkey) > Text Mode > Symbols to
 activate this input mode.
- 2. To enter a symbol, press the appropriate key indicated on the display.

To enter "emoticons" (smileys):

- From a screen where you can enter text, press
 OPTIONS (right softkey) > Text Mode > Smiley's to
 activate this input mode.
- To enter a smiley/emoticon, press the appropriate key indicated on the display.

To enter preset messages:

- From a screen where you can enter text, press
 OPTIONS (right softkey) > Add Preset Message to
 activate this input mode. (See "Selecting a Text
 Input Mode" on page 31.)
- 2. Highlight a message and press

Note: Preset messages make composing text messages easier by allowing you to enter quick messages, such as "Meet me at," "Let's get lunch," or a customized message of your own. (For more information on preset messages, please see "Managing Preset Messages" on page 53.)

Setting Text Options

The Text Options menu allows you to specify more automated features during the text entry process. These options can help streamline the text entry process by correcting for capitalization, spelling, spacing, and completing the most commonly entered words for you.

- From a screen where you can enter text, press
 OPTIONS (right softkey) > Text Mode > Text Settings
 and then use your navigation key to scroll down
 the list and activate the desired text entry option:
 - Auto-Capital: allows you to turn on or off the capitalization of the next character after a full stop punctuation is followed by a space.
 - Auto-Space allows you to turn on or off the ability to insert a space automatically after a word is selected from the candidate list.
 - Dual Language allows you to select word candidates to display in English only (None) or in Spanish (Spanish).
 - Word Choice List allows you to display an onscreen list of available word choices.
 - Word Prediction allows you to configure the phone to display possible word candidates after a preset number of characters have been entered.
 - Word Completion allows you to turn on or off the ability to insert predictive words into the text.
 - Use My Words allows you to turn on or off the ability to use words from your own custom dictionary.

Note: Yo can also access Text Entry options from the Settings menu. Press Menu > Settings > Text Entry.

Entering Characters In Dual Language

By enabling the Dual Language text option, you can use the keys for both English and Spanish text entry. If the Word Prediction and Word Completion text options are enabled, the available word choices presented are from both language sets (English/Spanish).

To enter characters in dual language mode:

- From a screen where you can enter text, press
 OPTIONS (right softkey) > Text Mode > Text Settings
 > Dual Language.
- Select Spanish and press . (See "Selecting a Text Input Mode" on page 31.)

To disable dual language mode:

- From a screen where you can enter text, press
 OPTIONS (right softkey) > Text Mode > Text Settings
 > Dual Language.

Entering Text in Landscape Mode

Accessing the QWERTY Keyboard

The Samsung Restore™ has a built-in, keyboard-style keypad, referred to as a full QWERTY keyboard. The keyboard is located beneath the display screen and is accessed by sliding it open. This orients the phone's display to landscape (widescreen) mode.

Using the QWERTY keyboard, you can type letters, numbers, punctuation, and other special characters into text entry fields or other applications simpler and faster than using the telephone keypad.

To open the phone and access the keyboard:

- 1. Rotate the phone 90 degrees counter-clockwise.
- Slide the top section of the phone up to open, as shown in the following illustration. When you slide the phone open, the display rotates from a vertical viewing mode (portrait) to a horizontal viewing mode (landscape).



Navigation Key in Landscape Mode


Just as the screen orientation is changed, so is the functionality of both the softkeys and the navigation key. The Up/Down/Left/Right options of the navigation key are also adjusted when the phone changes from portrait to landscape modes.



Entering Text Using the Keyboard

Your phone's keyboard provides a convenient way to enter letters, numbers, and symbols whenever you are prompted to enter text. Using your phone's keyboard is just like using any standard computer keyboard, except that here each key has a primary character in white on the bottom (usually letters) and a secondary character in red on the top (numbers and punctuation).

Secondary characters are accessed by first pressing the Function key (Fn).



The following keys perform special functions when entering text:

Sym A	Sym – Launches the Symbols page. Press fn and fn to choose from onscreen symbols by using their associated numbers.

.?	www - Inserts either a question mark into your text or when used in conjunction with rn it inserts www	
Space	Space – Inserts an empty space.	
.com	 COM – Inserts either a period into your text or when used in conjunction with fn it inserts a .com. 	
Enter	OK/Enter – Accepts a change or option. While entering text, moves the insertion point to the next line in a message, like the Enter key on a computer keyboard.

Back – Deletes the previous character, similar to the backspace key on a computer keyboard.

Note: In some applications, certain fields may default to entering numbers (such as the phone number fields in Contacts). In others, you will need to use to enter numbers.

Getting to Know Sprint One Click

Sprint One Click brings all your favorite features to your fingertips. Instead of navigating through the levels of a traditional phone menu, this design puts the things you need the most – features like text messaging, Internet access, and GPS navigation – right up front. Not only can you access what you need right away, you get to choose what and where it all goes.

Using the Sprint One Click main screen is easy once you've learned a few basics.

The Sprint One Click Main Screen



The illustration above shows the basic layout of your phone's main screen, also known as the standby screen. The callouts highlight what you'll need to know to get started with Sprint One Click.

 Carousel – The carousel is the bottom row of tiles, or icons, on your main screen. Using the navigation key (Optical Joystick) left or right moves the carousel.
 The tile in the center is the selected tile, and it's menu

- is displayed. In the illustration, the **Home** tile () is in the center, so the Home screen is displayed.
- Tiles The tiles are the individual icons on the carousel. Each tile displays a specific menu, such as Messaging and Internet. The carousel can hold up to 15 tiles, which you can add, remove, and rearrange to suit your needs. The Home tile (♠) provides access to the phone's full menu, and it is the only one that cannot be moved or removed.
- Function Keys The keys you'll use to navigate through the main screen are:
 - Navigation key (Menu/OK): The navigation key doubles as a touch-sensitive optical joystick and OK Key.
 - Use the Optical Joystick to move the carousel and select tiles. Selected tiles occupy the center position. Scroll across the Optical Joystick up or down to highlight bubbles (Home screen only) or menu items.
 - Press to select highlighted menu items. From the Home () screen, press to display the phone's full menu.

- Softkeys: Press the left or right softkey (while in Portrait or Landscape modes) to perform the action or access the menu indicated by the text directly above it on the display.
- End/Power key (): Press from any menu or tile to return to the Home () screen.

Take the Tutorial

Your phone has a built-in menu of tutorials to teach you all you need to know about Sprint One Click.

- Highlight and press OPTIONS (left softkey) > Tutorial.
 - or –
 - Select (Personalize My Phone) > Tutorial.
- Highlight a topic and press to display the tutorial.
 - Topics include: Getting Started, Changing the Carousel, Adding a Tile, Removing a Tile, Alerts and Notifications, Dismissing, and Finding Dismissed.

Tip: To see a full menu of tutorials when viewing another topic in the tutorial, press **INDEX** (left softkey).

Personalizing the Carousel

Now that you know what the carousel is, it's time to make it work for you by adding, removing, or rearranging tiles to match how you want to use your phone.

Adding a Tile to the Carousel

- Highlight and press OPTIONS (left softkey) > Personalize Carousel.
- Press Add Tile (left softkey), select a tile category (New, All, News & Sports, Communicate & Tools, Web& Communities, Social Networks, Entertainment & Games, Money & Weather, or Green) and then highlight a tile.
- To add the tile, press ADD (left softkey) or press . (To view a preview, press PREVIEW [right softkey].)

Note: Tile categories and available tiles are continually being updated, and there are dozens of tiles to choose from. The following table shows a sampling of the default tiles that may be preloaded on your phone.

Removing a Tile From the Carousel

- Highlight and press OPTIONS (left softkey) > Personalize Carousel.
- Scroll the navigation key left or right to select a tile, and then highlight Remove Tile and press

Shortcut: From the main screen, highlight a tile and press OPTIONS (left softkey) > Remove Tile. Remember that you cannot remove, move, or replace the Home tile.

Rearranging Tiles on the Carousel

- Highlight and press OPTIONS (left softkey) > Personalize Carousel.
- Scroll the navigation key left or right to select a location, and then press INSERT (left softkey) or to place the tile.

Shortcut: From the main screen, highlight a tile, press OPTIONS (left softkey) > Move Tile, and then complete step 3.

Replacing Tiles on the Carousel

If your carousel is full or if you just want to swap out one tile for another, you can replace an existing tile with another.

- Highlight and press OPTIONS (left softkey) > Personalize Carousel.
- Scroll the navigation key left or right to select a tile, and then highlight Replace Tile and press
- 3. Select a tile category and then highlight a tile.

 To replace the previous tile, press REPLACE (left softkey) or press to place the tile.

Editing Tiles

Certain tiles, such as Shortcuts, contain editable content. You can use the Personalize Carousel menu to edit these tiles.

Sound Settings

Ringer Types

Ringer types help you identify incoming calls and messages. You can assign ringer types to individual Contacts entries, types of calls, and types of messages.

Selecting Ringer Types

Your phone provides a variety of ringer options that allow you to customize your ring and volume settings. These options allow you to identify incoming calls by the ring.

- Highlight and press >Settings > Ringers.
- Select the entry for which you want to add a ringer type (Incoming Calls [Contact Entries, Unsaved Numbers, Private/Unknown], Voicemail, Messages, Alarm/Calendar, Power Up/Down, and Battery Alert).
- Highlight a ringer type (Downloaded, Preloaded, or No Ringer).
- 4. Highlight the file and press ____ to assign a ringer.

Getting New Ringers

A wide variety of new ringers is available from the Sprint Digital Lounge, and you can access them right from your phone. (Additional charges may apply, but some are free.)

- Highlight and press >My Stuff > Ringers > Get New Ringers.
- Use your navigation key to search through available ringers. When you find one you want, highlight it and press
- To make a purchase, highlight Buy and press (Your phone automatically downloads the ringer.)
- When the download is finished, select an option to continue:
 - Listen to listen to the ringer.
 - Set As to assign the ringer to a call or message type or to a specific contact.
 - Shop to browse for other items to download.

Adjusting the Phone's Volume Settings

Adjust your phone's volume settings to suit your needs and your environment.

- 1. Highlight and press > Settings > Volume.
- Select Incoming Ringer Volume, Playback Volume, or Key Beeps.

3. Using the navigation or volume keys, choose a volume level and press.

Tip: You can adjust the ringer volume in standby mode (or the earpiece volume during a call) by using the volume button on the left side of your phone.

Select Always Vibrate (or VIB ON [left softkey]) if you wish the phone to vibrate in addition to ringing at the selected volume setting.

Vibrate

To set your phone to vibrate instead of making any sounds:

With the phone open, press the volume button down in standby mode until you see "Vibrate All" on the screen.

To set your phone always to vibrate in addition to any ringer settings:

 With the phone open, press the volume button up or down in standby mode until a volume setting appears on the screen. Press VIB ON (left softkey) to check the Always Vibrate option. (If you have already checked the option, pressing VIB OFF (left softkey) deselects the option.)

Silence All

The Silence All option allows you to mute all sounds without turning your phone off.

To activate Silence All:

With the phone open, press and hold the volume button down in standby mode. (You will see "Silence All.")

To deactivate Silence All:

Press the volume button up repeatedly to select a volume level.

Selecting a Key Tone

Your phone offers a number of options for selecting the audible tones accompanying a keypress.

Highlight and press >Settings > Volume > Key Beeps.

- 2. Highlight an option and press
 - Tone Type to select the sound of a keypress (Lucid, DTMF, or Voice).
 - Tone Volume to select a keypress volume level.
- 3. Highlight an available option from one of the above menus and press .

Display Settings

Changing the Backlight Time Length

Select how long the display screen remains backlit or when the backlight turns off after you press any key.

To adjust the Backlight dimming feature:

- 1. Highlight and press Settings > Display > Backlight Control > Backlight Dim.
- 2. Select a time setting and press ...
 - Select Slide Open, 8 seconds, 15 seconds, 30 seconds, or Always Dim.

Note: Long backlight settings reduce the battery's talk and standby times.

To adjust the Backlight Off feature:

- Highlight and press Settings > Display > Backlight Control > Backlight Off.
- 2. Select a time setting and press
 - Select 1 minute, 30 seconds, or 15 seconds.

To adjust the Java Backlight feature:

Select how long the display screen remains backlit while in a Java application.

- Highlight and press Settings > Display > Backlight Control > Java Backlight.
- 2. Select a time setting and press
 - Select Default or Continuous.

Changing the Display Screen

Choose what you see on the display screen while powering on or off and when in standby mode (screen saver).

Highlight and press Settings > Display > Screen Saver.

- Choose where to obtain the image from (No Image, Take New Picture, My Albums, Downloaded, or Preloaded) and press to view it. (Once you see an image, use your navigation key to scroll through and view other available images.)
- 3. Highlight an image and press ____ to assign it.

To make an online image purchase, highlight Buy and press . (Your phone automatically downloads the image). For more information on downloading images, see "Downloading Games, Ringers, and More" on page 138.)

4. Press ASSIGN (left softkey) to assign an image.

Changing the Brightness

– or –

Adjust your screen's brightness (contrast) to suit your surroundings.

- 1. Highlight and press Settings > Display > Brightness.
- Scroll your navigation key left or right to adjust the screen contrast and press or press DONE (left softkey).

Activating the PowerSave Mode

- Highlight and press Settings > Display > PowerSave Mode.
- 2. Highlight either On or Off and press

Changing the Phone's Menu Style

Choose the layout of your phone's menu.

- 1. Highlight and press
- Press the left softkey to toggle between these options.
 - GRID VIEW to view the menu as a grid.
 - LIST VIEW to display the menu as a list.

Display Language

You can choose to display your phone's onscreen menus in English or in Spanish.

- Highlight and press > Settings > Others > Language.
- 2. Highlight English or Español and press

Location Settings

Your phone is equipped with a Location feature for use in connection with location-based services.

The Location feature allows the network to detect your position. Turning Location off will hide your location from everyone except 911.

Note: Turning Location on will allow the network to detect your position using GPS technology, making some Sprint applications and services easier to use. Turning Location off will disable the GPS location function for all purposes except 911, but will not hide your general location based on the cell site serving your call. No application or service may use your location without your request or permission. GPS-enhanced 911 is not available in all areas.

To enable your phone's Location feature:

- 1. Highlight and press Settings > Location. (You will see the Location disclaimer.)
- 2. Read the disclaimer and press **OK** (left softkey).
- Highlight On or Off and press > DONE (left softkey).

When you turn the Location feature on, the phone displays the icon. When you turn Location off, the phone displays the icon.

Messaging Settings

Your phone's advanced messaging capabilities let you send and receive many different kinds of text messages without placing a voice call. (For more information, see "Accessing Messages" on page 135.)

Messaging settings allow you to decide how you would like to be notified of new messages, create a signature with each sent message, and create your own preset messages.

Setting Message Notification

When you receive a message, your phone notifies you by displaying an icon on your display screen. You can also choose to be notified with a message notification on your display screen.

- Highlight and press > Messages > Settings > Notification.
- Select Message & Icon or Icon Only.

Adding a Customized Signature

Add a customized signature to each message you send.

- Highlight and press > Messages >
 Settings > Signature > On. (If you do not wish to attach a signature, select Off.)
- 2. Enter a signature and press . (See "Entering Text in Portrait Mode" on page 31 or See "Entering Text in Landscape Mode" on page 35.)

Managing Preset Messages

Your phone is loaded with 20 preset messages to help make sending text messages easier. Customize or delete these messages, such as "Where are you?," "Let's get lunch," and "Meet me at" to suit your needs, or add your own messages to the list.

To edit or delete a preset message:

Highlight and press > Messages > Settings > Preset Messages. (You will see the list of preset messages.)

- Select EDIT (left softkey) to edit the message (see "Entering Text in Portrait Mode" on page 31 or see "Entering Text in Landscape Mode" on page 35), and press
- To delete a single message, highlight it and press OPTIONS (right softkey) > Delete.

- or -

To delete all current preset messages, select **OPTIONS** (right softkey) > **Delete All** to delete the messages. (Select **CLOSE** (right softkey) to cancel the deletion.)

To add a new preset message:

- Highlight and press > Messages > Settings > Preset Messages. (You will see the list of preset messages.)
- To add a new message, select **OPTIONS** (right softkey) > **Add New**.
- Enter your message and press . (Your new message will be added to the beginning of the list.)

Other Text Message Settings

These settings allow you to configure the options associated with a text message sent from your phone. These options include:

 Callback Number - allows you to set the callback number for the recipient to view when receiving a text message.

To activate a callback number:

- Highlight and press > Messages > Settings > Callback Number.
- Select None, <your phone number>, or Other.

Airplane Mode

Airplane Mode allows you to use many of your phone's features, such as Games, Notepad, and Voice Memos, when you are in an airplane or in any other area where making or receiving calls or data is prohibited. When you set your phone to Airplane Mode, it cannot send or receive any calls or access online information.

- Highlight and press > Settings > Others > Airplane Mode.
- 2. Read the disclaimer and press **OK** (left softkey).
- 3. Highlight On or Off or On Power Up and press

While in Airplane Mode, your phone's standby screen will display "Phone off."

TTY Use With Sprint Service

A TTY (also known as a TDD or Text Telephone) is a telecommunications phone that allows people who are deaf, hard of hearing, or who have speech or language disabilities, to communicate by telephone.

Your phone is compatible with select TTY devices. Please check with the manufacturer of your TTY device to ensure that it is compatible with digital cell phones. Your phone and TTY device will connect via a special cable that plugs into your phone's headset jack. If this cable was not provided with your TTY device, contact your TTY device manufacturer to purchase the connector cable.

To turn TTY Mode on or off:

- Highlight and press >Settings>Others>
 TTY Options. (An informational message will be displayed.)
- 2. Press **DONE** (left softkey).
- 3. Select TTY Off to turn TTY mode off.
 - or -

Touch any of the following to enable the feature:

• TTY Full, TTY + Talk, or TTY + Hear.

To access the state Telecommunications Relay Service (TRS) for assistance with TTY calls:

Dial and press to reach an operator.

Note: In TTY Mode, your phone will display the TTY access icon.

If TTY mode is enabled, the audio quality of non-TTY devices connected to the headset jack may be impaired.

WARNING: 911 Emergency Calling

Sprint recommends that TTY users make emergency calls by other means, including Telecommunications Relay Services (TRS), analog cellular, and landline communications. Wireless TTY calls to 911 may be corrupted when received by public safety answering points (PSAPs), rendering some communications unintelligible. The problem encountered appears related to software used by PSAPs. This matter has been brought to the attention of the FCC, and the wireless industry and the PSAP community are currently working to resolve this.

Phone Setup Options

Main Screen Shortcuts

Your phone's Sprint One Click main screen lets you customize your phone and provides quick access to the features and functions you use most. See "Personalizing the Carousel" on page 44 for details.

Your phone offers you the option of assigning shortcuts to favorite or often-used functions. Pressing the navigation key to the assigned direction in standby mode will launch your personally designated shortcuts.

To create a new Shortcut:

- Select from one of the following categories: My Stuff, My Album, Bookmark, or Menu Item.
- Press ASSIGN (left softkey) to make the new shortcut assignment.

To select a current Shortcut:

- 1. Highlight of to access the Shortcuts menu.
- Using the navigation key, select a current shortcut and press
- 3. Press **property** to return to the standby mode.

Setting Abbreviated Dialing

To activate the Contacts Match feature:

- Highlight and press >Settings > Others > Contact Match.
- 2. Select On or Off.

To activate the Prepend feature:

- Highlight and press >Settings > Others >
 Abbreviated Dialing.
- 2. Select On.
- Enter the first five- or six-digit prefix in the ABBREV. DIAL field and then press DONE (left softkey).
 - To deactivate this feature, select Off during step 2 above.

Tip: To make an Abbreviated Dial call, see "Abbreviated Dialing" on page 29.

Note: This setting does not apply to 911 or Sprint 411.

Security Settings

Your Phone's Lock Feature

Locking Your Phone

When your phone is locked, you can only receive incoming calls or make calls to 911, Sprint Customer Service, or special numbers.

Highlight and press Settings > Lock
 Phone > Lock Now.

Note: Your current Lock Code is displayed at the top of the screen. If you decide to change it, you must select Change Lock Code (page 58).

Unlocking Your Phone

- 1. From standby mode, press UNLOCK (left softkey).
- 2. Enter your lock code.

Changing the Lock Code

- Highlight and press > Settings > Lock
 Phone and enter your lock code.
- 2. Select Change Lock Code.
- 3. Enter your new lock code and press
- 4. Re-enter your new lock code and press



You can place calls to 911 and to your special numbers when in lock mode.

To call an emergency number, special number, or Sprint Customer Service, enter the phone number and press

Deleting Phone Content

Use the Reset/Delete menu to quickly erase all the content you have created or stored in your phone.

1. Highlight and press > Settings > Reset/Delete and enter your lock code.

- Select Delete Stuff and select an option.
 - Text Messages to erase all text messages from your phone.
 - Call Logs to erase your entire call log (history) from your phone.
 - Cookies and Cache to erase all your website cookies and Internet page/content cache from your phone.
 - Downloaded Content to erase all downloaded content from your phone.
 - Contacts to erase all from your phone.
 - Pictures/Videos to erase all pictures and videos stored on your phone.

Note: This does not affect those image and videos stored on the microSD card.

3. Press **DELETE** (left softkey) to confirm the deletion.

Resetting Your Phone's Settings

Resetting the phone settings only restores all of the factory defaults, including the ringer types and display settings. Onboard data such as Contacts, History, and Messaging are not affected.

- 1. Highlight and press > Settings > Reset/Delete.
- 2. Enter your lock code.
- 3. Highlight Reset Settings and press

Note: If Parental Control has been enabled, this code will also need to be entered before continuing.

Press RESET (left softkey) to reset the phone's settings.

Resetting Your Phone

Resetting the phone restores all of the factory defaults, including the ringer types and display settings and deletes all content stored on the phone.

- Highlight and press > Settings > Reset/Delete and enter your lock code.
- 2. Enter your new lock code.
- 3. Highlight Reset Phone and press
- 4. Press **RESET** (left softkey) to restore your phone to its factory default state.

Security Features for Data Services

Enabling and Disabling Data Services

You can disable data services without turning off your phone; however, you will not have access to all data services, including Web and messaging. Disabling data services will avoid any charges associated with these services. While signed out, you can still place or receive phone calls, check voicemail, and use other voice services. You may enable data services again at any time.

To disable data services:

- Highlight and press > Settings > Others > Data > On/Off. (You will see a message.)
- Select NEXT (left softkey) > Disable Sprint Data Services to confirm that you want to sign out and deactivate data.

To enable data services:

- Highlight and press > Settings > Others > Data > Off. (A message is displayed.)
- Highlight Connect > Yes and press to enable data services.

Net Guard

When you first connect to the Web, the Net Guard will be displayed to confirm that you want to connect. This feature helps you avoid accidental connections. You can disable the Net Guard in the future by selecting Always Auto-Connect when the Net Guard is displayed.

To change your Net Guard settings:

- Highlight and press > Settings > Others > Data > Net Guard
 - Select On to activate the Net Guard.
 - Select Off to deactivate the Net Guard.

Note: When enabled, the Net Guard appears only once as long as you have not turned the phone off and on.

Using Parental Controls

You can disable certain phone services without turning off your phone. You can restrict access to all data services, including Web and messaging.

Disabling data services will avoid any charges associated with these services. While signed out, you can still place or receive phone calls, check voicemail. and use other voice services. You may enable data services again at any time.

New Parental Controls provide restrictions to various phone services such as Voice, Messaging, Data, and Camera.

These restrictions are governed by an independent Parental Code that is separate from the previously mentioned Lock code.

To enable Parental Controls:

- 1. Highlight \(\hat{\alpha} \) and press > Settings > Parental Controls.
- 2. Highlight On/Off and press
- 3. Highlight On and press
- 4. If this is your first time to setup these controls, you will be asked to setup a parental lock code that manages the areas that will be locked via this menu.
 - Enter a new four-digit code and press
 - Re-enter the new code and press **DONE** (left softkev).

To disable Parental Controls:

- Highlight and press >Settings > Parental Controls.
- 2. Enter your new parental lock code.
- 3. Highlight On/Off and press
- 4. Highlight Off and press

Configuring Restrictions

To disable data services:

- Highlight and press > Settings > Parental Controls > Restrictions.
- 2. Read the onscreen disclaimer and press **CONTINUE** (left softkey).
- Select any of the following entries to either activate or deactivate an option.
 - Voice Calls to lock the phone and prevent outgoing calls. Incoming calls can still be received.
 - Text Messaging to restrict access to the Messaging folder, including all Text and Picture messages.

- Web to restrict access to all data features such as Internet, Video Streaming, and other data usage.
- Camera/Camcorder to restrict access to both the Camera and Camcorder functionality.
- Force Location On to restrict access to the Location functionality.
- 4. Highlight On or Off and press
- 5. Press 5 to return to the previous page.

Changing the Parental Control Code

- Highlight and press Settings > Parental Controls > Change Parental Control Code.
- 2. Enter your current four-digit code.
- 3. Enter a new four-digit code.



Viewing History

History is a list of the last 240 phone numbers for calls you placed, accepted, or missed. History makes redialing a number fast and easy. It is continually updated as your phone automatically adds new numbers to the beginning of the list and removes the oldest entries from the bottom of the list.

When you place, accept, or miss a call, a record of the call is saved in the Recent History list. When you view the numbers in this list, the phone icon to the left of the number indicates the call type:

- Missed: Indicates any missed calls.
- Received: Indicates any received calls that were answered.
- Dialed: Indicates all outgoing calls made from your phone.



Each entry contains the phone number (if it is available) and Contacts entry name (if the number is in your Contacts). Duplicate calls (same number and type of call) may only appear once on the list.

- 1. Highlight and press >History
- 2. Highlight an entry and press

Shortcut: You can also press quantification from standby mode to display your recent calls.

Note: You may also be able to access History from your phone's man screen carousel. See section 2B "Navigating the Main Screen" on page 42 for details.

History records only calls that occur while the phone is turned on. If a call is received while your phone is turned off, it will not be included in history.

If you return a call from the voicemail menu, it will not be included in your phone's history.

History Options

Highlight a History entry from the Recent History screen and press to display the date and time of the call, the phone number (if available), and the caller's name (if the number is already in your Contacts).

- Highlight and press > History.
- Press SEND MSG (left softkey) to send the currently selected history entry a new text message.
 - or -

Highlight an entry and press **OPTIONS** (right softkey) to display the following options:

- New Group to save the current history entry to a new group.
- Save to save the number if it is not already in your Contacts. (See "Saving a Number From History" on page 64.)
- Contact Details to display the Contact entries' details.
- Delete to delete the entry.
- Delete All to delete all History entries.

Tip: You can also view the next History entry by scrolling the navigation key down or view the previous entry by scrolling the navigation key up.

Making a Call From History

- 1. Highlight and press > History.
- 2. Highlight an entry and press <a>-.

Note: You cannot make calls from History to entries identified as No ID or Restricted.

Tip: Press from the standby screen to also bring up the Recent History screen where you can then select an entry.

Saving a Number From History

Your phone can store up to 1000 Contacts entries. Contacts entries can store up to a total of 7000 phone numbers, and each entry's name can contain 64 characters.

- Highlight a History entry and press OPTIONS (right softkey) > Save.
- Highlight New Entry or Existing Entry and press
- Highlight a label (Mobile, Home, Work, Pager, Fax, or Other) and press
- Use the keypad or keyboard to type in the new entry name.
 - or -

Highlight an existing Contacts entry and press



- Make any other selection or entries for this new Contact.
- Press DONE (left softkey) to save the new entry to your Contacts list and exit.

After you have saved the number, your phone displays the new Contacts entry. (See "Contacts Entry Options" on page 68.)

Note: You cannot save phone numbers already in your Contacts or from calls identified as No ID or Restricted.

Erasing History

To erase individual History entries, see "History Options" on page 63.

- 1. Highlight and press >History.

Tip: ICE - In Case of Emergency

To make it easier for emergency personnel to identify important contacts, you can list your local emergency contacts under "ICE" in your phone's Contacts list. For example, if your mother is your primary emergency contact, list her as "ICE–Mom" in your Contacts. To list more than one emergency contact, use "ICE1-___," "ICE2-___," etc.

Adding a New Group

Groups allow you to communicate simultaneously by sending out a broadcast text message to every member of a current group.

Wireless Backup

This feature allows you to back up all of your contacts to the Sprint website and restore them if your phone is lost, stolen, damaged, or replaced.

To subscribe to the wireless backup service, you must purchase a license to use the service through your phone's browser. The license expires after a set period of time and you must renew it regularly. As part of the initial subscription process, the service generates a random wireless backup password. - 10. Press **DONE** (left softkey) to save the event.

Event Alert Menu

When your phone is turned on and you have an event alarm scheduled, your phone alerts you and displays the event summary. There are several ways your phone alerts you to scheduled events:

 15 minutes, or 20 minutes.

Memo Pad

This calculator can assist you in determining fuel economy.

To create a new Eco calculation:

Note: If there are no Eco calculations saved, the Eco Calculator screen is empty.

Use your keyboard and navigation keys to enter the distance, price of gas/gallon, and number of gallons. (The application instantly calculates the fuel efficiency values.)

World Clock

To view the time in over 50 different locations:

- Highlight and press >Tools > World Time.
- 2. Use the navigation key left or right to scroll through different cities and time zones.
- Press SET DST (left softkey) to turn daylight saving time on or off.

Updating Your Phone

The update phone option allows you to download and update the software in your phone automatically. Only the internal software is updated; no Contacts entries or other information saved to your phone will be deleted.

Automatic Speech Recognition (ASR)

You can use your phone's built-in automatic speech recognition (ASR) software to dial a phone number in your Contacts or to launch phone functions. All you have to do is to talk into the phone, and ASR will recognize your voice and complete tasks by itself.

Activating ASR

▶ Press and hold or or □

The screen displays "Say a command" and the phone prompts you to say the name of the command you

want to use. To complete your task, simply follow the voice prompts.

Available ASR commands include:

- Call <Name or#> to call an entry in your Contacts list or a spoken phone number. (See "Making a Voice Call With ASR" on page 86.)
- Send Message <Name or #> to launch text messaging on your phone and specify a recipient for a new message. (See "Send a Text Message" on page 86.)
- Lookup <Name> to lookup a Contacts entry name from your current list of available contacts. (See "Opening Menus With ASR" on page 87.)
- Go To <menu> to jump directly to menu items or applications. (See "Opening Menus With ASR" on page 87.)
- Check <item> to check your phone's status. (See "Checking Phone Status Using ASR" on page 87.)

Tip: Use ASR in a quiet environment so it can accurately recognize your commands.

During ASR operation, press **Tutorial** (left softkey) to get instructions using the software.

Making a Voice Call With ASR

- 1. Press and hold 🦳 or 🥰 .
- 2. If you hear "Say a command," say "Call."
- 3. If the location is not recognized or the name does not have a number stored in Contacts, your phone will play the message "No match found, Try Again?"
- 4. If you hear "Say the name or number," say a name or a phone number.
- If you hear "Which location?," say a number type (for example, "Mobile").

Tip: You can skip steps 4 and 5 by saying a name and location after "Call" without pausing (for example, "Call John Jones mobile1").

Note: If ASR does not recognize the name or number, it will find the most likely matches and display a list of up to three names or numbers. You will hear "Did you say..." followed by the name or number. You can confirm by saying "Yes." Say "No" to change the selection.

Send a Text Message

Use automatic speech recognition to launch text messaging on your phone and specify a recipient for the message.

- 1. Press and hold 🔼 or 🥵 .
- Say "Send Message" followed immediately by the name of a person in your Contacts list and, optionally, the type of number (Mobile1, Home1, etc.) you want to send it to. For example, say "Send Message John Smith Mobile1."

If you do not specify the number type and there are multiple numbers for the name, your phone chooses the mobile number by default.

If you say "Send Message" without specifying a recipient, your phone prompts you with "Say the name or number." Say the name of a person in your Contacts list and, optionally, the type of number.

- Use either the keypad or keyboard to enter text and press SEND (left softkey) to complete the process.
 - Selecting OPTIONS (right softkey) provide you with additional message selections. See "Messaging (SMS/MMS)" on page 119.

Look Up a Contacts Entry

Look up and display contact information for any person stored in your Contacts list by saying "Contacts" followed by the name.

- 1. Press and hold or .
- Say "Lookup John Smith." The entry information for the specified contact is then displayed.

If you say only "Lookup" your phone prompts you with "Say the name."

Opening Menus With ASR

You can jump directly to many menu items or applications by saying "Go to" followed by a menu option.

- 1. Press and hold or 🕏
- 2. If you hear "Say a command," say "Go To."
- 3. If you hear "Which shortcut?," say an application name (for example, "Messages").
- 4. The phone opens the selected menu.

Checking Phone Status Using ASR

You can use ASR to obtain information about your phone:

- Status (all of the previous except My Phone Number)
- Time
- Signal Strength
- Network
- Battery
- My Phone Number
 - 1. Press and hold 🗨 or 🗗
- 2. If you hear "Say a command," say "Check."
- 3. If you hear "Which status item?," say a command.

ASR Options

To change ASR confirmation:

- 1. Press and hold 🦳 or 🥰 .
- Press SETTINGS (right softkey) > Confirmation and select an option.
 - Automatic to ask for confirmation only when the system is not sure what you said.

- Always Confirm to always ask for confirmation.
- Never Confirm to never ask for confirmation.

To adapt the system to your voice:

- 1. Press and hold 🗨 or 🗳 .
- Press SETTINGS (right softkey) > Adaptation > Adapt Voice.
- Press START (left softkey) and repeat each word, phrase, or telephone number you hear.

To reset the adaptation:

- 1. Press and hold or or .
- Press SETTINGS (right softkey) > Adaptation > Reset Voice > YES (left softkey).

To change the ASR mode:

- 1. Press and hold 🗨 or 🗳 .
- Press SETTINGS (right softkey) > Audio Modes and select an option.
 - Expert Mode to sound a beep only.
 - Prompt Mode to prompt for required information.

Managing Voice Memos

Use your phone's Voice Services to record brief memos to remind you of important events, phone numbers, or grocery list items.

Recording Voice Memos

- 1. Highlight and press > Tools > Voice Memo > Record.
- 2. Begin recording after the prompt.

To end the recording of your memo:

Press or FINISH (right softkey).

To record a conversation during a phone call:

During a call, press OPTIONS (right softkey)
 Voice Memo. (A one-minute counter [oo] is displayed on the screen indicating the amount of time a single voice memo can be recorded.)

Note: Incoming audio is recorded when Voice Memo is selected during a call.

To end the recording of your conversation:

Press or STOP (right softkey).

Note: Your phone can store a total of 10 one-minute memos.

Voice Memo Options

To play the voice memos you have recorded:

- Highlight and press >Tools > Voice Memo > Review. (The phone displays a list of saved memos, with the first one selected.)
- 2. Highlight the desired memo and press

– or –

Press the number corresponding to the memo you want to review.

Note: Voice Memos recorded from a direct phone conversation are shown in the list with the phone number used during the recording process.

Erasing Voice Memos

To erase all voice memos:

- 1. Highlight
 ↑ and press
 > Tools > Voice Memo > Review.
- Highlight the desired memo to erase and press OPTIONS (right softkey) > Delete All.
- 3. Press **DELETE** (left softkey).

Editing a Voice Memo Caption

By default, the caption assigned to a voice memo is a sequential file name which consists of the date (Month_Day) followed by the memo number. For example, two memos recorded on February 2, 2010, would be listed as: Feb_02x1 and Feb_02x2. These file names (captions) can be changed.

- Highlight and press Tools > Voice Memo > Review.
- Highlight the desired memo and press OPTIONS (right softkey) > Edit Caption.

- 3. Press to delete the previous text and then use either the keypad or keyboard to enter a new caption for the selected memo.
- Press DONE (left softkey) to save the memo with the new caption text.

Viewing the Information for a Voice Memo

- Highlight and press > Tools > Voice Memo > Review.
- 2. Highlight the desired memo to erase and press **OPTIONS** (right softkey) > **Info**.

Your Phone's microSD Card and Adapter

The microSD Card

Your phone comes with a 2GB microSD™ (Secure Digital) memory card to expand the phone's available memory space. It allows you to store images, videos, and music in your phone.

Inserting the microSD Card

 Remove the battery cover (located on the back of the phone).



Place your fingernail into the Release Latch indention (adjacent to the microphone) and carefully lift (1) the case off the rear of the phone (2).

- Locate the microSD card slot on the side of the phone.
- 4. With the gold contact pins facing downward, carefully insert the microSD card into the opening and firmly push it in until you hear a click indicating the card is securely installed (3).



Replace the cover by lining up the tabs and then firmly pressing the cover down until it snaps into place. Check that the battery is still properly installed before turning on the phone.

Note: You can easily damage the microSD card and its adapter by improper operation. Please be careful when inserting, removing, or handling them.

Removing the microSD Card

- 1. Repeat steps 1-3 from "Inserting the microSD Card" on page 91.
- Firmly press the card into the slot and release (it should pop partially out of the slot.
- 3. Remove the card from the slot.
- Replace the cover by lining up the tabs and then firmly pressing the cover down until it snaps into place. Check that the battery is still properly installed before turning on the phone.

Note: Be sure to use only recommended microSD cards (up to 32GB). Using non-recommended microSD cards could cause data loss and damage your phone.

Note: DO NOT remove a microSD card while files are being accessed or transferred. Doing so will result in loss or damage of data.

Make sure your battery is fully charged before using the microSD card. Your data may become damaged or unusable if the battery runs out while using the microSD card.

microSD Adapter

The supplied microSD adapter allows you to use microSD cards in other SD-compatible devices, like computers, cameras, and printers. Before using the microSD card with an SD-compatible device, you will need to insert the microSD card into the microSD adapter.

To insert the microSD card into the microSD adapter:

With the label side of the microSD card facing up, insert the card into the supplied microSD adapter, and gently slide the card until it is fully inserted.

To remove the microSD card from the microSD adapter:

Hold the front edge of the microSD card, and gently pull it out to remove it from the adapter.

Write Protection

The microSD adapter has a built-in Write Protection lock to prevent accidental overwriting or removal of your data when the microSD card and adapter are inserted in another device.

Slide the Write Protection lock tab down into the "Lock" position to prevent overwriting of data. To allow data to be added or removed from the microSD card, slide the Write Protection lock tab up into the normal position.

microSD Card Settings

Creating Folders in the microSD Card

The following steps allow your phone to create default folders for storing files in your microSD card.

With the microSD card inserted, highlight and press > Tools > Mass Storage > File Manager > Memory Card > OPTIONS (right softkey) > Create Folders.

Note: With a formatted microSD card, there are no default folders created. Upon initial access to the Camera, the phone creates a Graphic folder. Upon access to the Music Player, the Music/Tone folders are also created.

(The phone will create the microSD's default folders: Picture, Video, Voice, and Media.)

Viewing Memory in the microSD Card

With the microSD card inserted, highlight and press → Tools > Mass Storage > Memory Info > Card. (The used and available memory space will be displayed.)

Formatting the microSD Card

Formatting a microSD card permanently removes all files stored on the card.

- With the microSD card inserted, highlight and press > Tools > Mass Storage > Format Memory Card.
- 2. Enter your lock code.
- Press FORMAT (left softkey). (A warning will be displayed.)

Note: The formatting procedure erases all the data on the microSD card, after which the files CANNOT be retrieved. To prevent the loss of important data, please check the contents before you format the card.

microSD Card Folders

Displaying Your microSD Card Folders

All the files stored in your microSD are accessible through your microSD card folders.

- With the microSD card inserted, highlight and press Tools > Mass Storage > File Manager > Memory Card.
- 2. Highlight a folder and press
- 3. To view or play a file, highlight it and press

the appropriate softkey.



Note: For information on file and folder options available through File Manager, see "File Manager" on page 80.

Creating Folders in the microSD Card

The following steps allow your phone to create folders for storing files in your microSD card using only the File Manager.

- With the microSD card inserted, highlight and press Tools > Mass Storage > File Manager > Memory Card.
- 2. Press **OPTIONS** (right softkey) > **Create Folder**.
- Enter a name for the new folder and press DONE (left softkey) to save the new folder onto the card.

Connecting Your Phone to Your Computer

Before using your phone's mass storage capabilities, you need to prepare your phone's data services to synchronize with your desktop or laptop computer. Once you have connected the phone to the computer, you can transfer your data to or from the microSD card.

 With the phone turned on, plug one end of a compatible USB cable into the phone's Charger/ Accessories Jack. 2. Connect the other end of the cable to your computer and turn the phone on.



With the microSD card inserted, highlight and press > Tools > Mass Storage > Connect to to PC.

Note: During this connection via the USB port, you will be unable to use your phone to make or receive calls.

To remove the connection:

When you have finished transferring data, click the USB device icon on your computer's taskbar, and follow the onscreen instructions to safely unplug the USB cable.

- or -

Press **DISCONNECT** (right softkey) > **DISCONNECT** (left softkey).

Important Connection Information

- No driver installation is required for Windows 2000/ ME/XP/Vista users. If you use Windows 98/98SE, you have to download and install the USB Mass Storage Driver from the Sprint website at www.sprint.com.
- To avoid loss of data, DO NOT remove the USB cable, the microSD card, or the battery while files are being accessed or transferred.
- DO NOT use your computer to change or edit folder or file names on the microSD card, and do not attempt to transfer large amounts of data from the computer to the microSD card. Doing so may cause the microSD card to fail.

- DO NOT turn off or restart your computer, or put it into standby mode, while using a mass storage device. Doing so will result in loss or damage of data.
- While you are connected to the computer, your phone's screen will display "Phone Off." You cannot make or receive calls.
- If you connect a mass storage device to a peripheral device, your device may not work properly.

Taking Pictures

Taking pictures with your phone's built-in camera is as simple as choosing a subject, pointing the lens, and pressing a button. You can activate the phone's camera mode whether the phone is open or closed.

To take a picture:

Highlight and press > Photos & Videos > Camera to activate the camera mode. (Additional camera options are available through the camera mode OPTIONS menu. See "Camera Mode Options" on page 98 for more information.)

Shortcut: To activate camera mode, you can also press and hold the side camera button (). (See illustration on page 8.)

- Using the phone's display screen as a viewfinder, aim the camera lens at your subject.
- 3. Press or the side camera button until the shutter sounds. (Your phone automatically saves the picture to the selected storage area.)
 - To return to camera mode to take another picture, press.
- Once you've taken your picture, press **OPTIONS** (right softkey) for more options:
 - Send Picture to send your picture in a message.
 (See page 104 for details.)
 - Camera to return to the camera to take additional pictures.

- Assign to assign the picture as a Picture ID or Screen Saver.
- Erase to delete the picture you just took.
- Review Album to go to the My Photos & Videos folder where you can review your saved pictures.

Assigning Pictures

After taking a picture, assign it as a screen saver or as a picture ID for a Contacts entry.

- 1. Take a picture. (See steps 1–3 on page 97.)
- With the picture displayed, press OPTIONS (right softkey) > Assign, and select an option.
 - Picture ID to assign the picture to either a Contacts entry, Unsaved Numbers, or to a Private/Unknown number. Highlight an entry and press to assign the picture.
 - Screensaver to assign the picture as a screen saver. Press to assign the picture.

Tip: You can also assign pictures from the My Photos & Videos menu. See "In Phone Folder and microSD Card Options" on page 103.

Camera Mode Options

When the phone is open and in camera mode, press **OPTIONS** (right softkey) to display additional camera options:

- MODE to select a cameras mode: Camera or Camcorder. To switch to video mode. (See "Recording Videos" on page 101.)
- SHOOTING MODE to select the picture mode. Choose from the following:
 - Single Shot to take a single image.
 - Continuous to take multiple shots. (See "Taking Multiple Shots" on page 100.)
 - Mosaic to take a series of pictures and then combine them into a single image.
 - Panorama to take multiple images and have them combined to create a panoramic image.
 - Night Shot to take a photo in low light conditions.
- RESOLUTION to set the picture's resolution (2M, 1.3M, High, Med, and Low).

- WHITE BALANCE to adjust white balance based on changing lighting conditions (Auto, Daylight, Cloudy, Incandescent, Fluorescent, or Manual). (The default setting is Auto.)
- Brightness to adjust the image brightness level. Press the navigation key up (increase) or down (decrease) to select a setting. (The default setting is 0.)
- SELF TIMER to activate the camera's timer. (See "Self Timer" on page 99.)
- EFFECT to apply an image effect. Selects a wide variety of color tones for the picture. (The default setting is None.)
- QUALITY to select the picture quality setting (Fine, Normal, or Economy).
- Shutter Sound to select a shutter sound (Shutter 1-3 or Off).
- AUTO-SEND to select whether to automatically send the new taken image to the assigned storage location (On) or be prompted after an image is taken (Off).
- Storage to select the destination for the image files (Phone or Card).

Self Timer

- From camera mode, press **OPTIONS** (right softkey) > **SELF TIMER**.
- Highlight the length of delay you want the timer to use (5 Sec or 10 Sec) and press
- Press when you are ready to start the timer. (The timer is displayed on the upper-left portion of the display screen during the self-timer countdown.)
- Get ready for the picture. (When the timer is down to three seconds, the self-timer icon will turn red and the phone will begin to beep.)

To cancel the self-timer after it has started:

▶ Press 5

Note: While the Self Timer is active, all keys are disabled except .

Taking Multiple Shots

This feature allows you to take up to nine shots in a continuous sequence.

- From camera mode, press OPTIONS (right softkey) > SHOOTING MODE > Continuous.
- 2. Highlight an option and press
 - Off to deactivate the multiple shots option.
 - 5 Shots to take a series of five pictures.
 - 10 Shots to take a series of ten pictures (image resolution is set to Low).

Note: Your phone automatically saves the pictures in your selected storage area at 320 x 240 resolution.

Customized Screen

These features allow you to customize how the onscreen viewfinder is displayed.

 From camera mode, press the QWERTY up or down arrows, or scroll over the navigation key up or down. You will see the following options: View/Hide information bars to toggle on or off the display all of the current camera information such as battery level (Image size, quality, storage location, etc...



Photos & Videos folder

Camera Options

 View/Hide quadrants to toggle on or off an onscreen quadrant that can be used to position your subjects. Press the side camera button to take the picture. (Your phone automatically saves the picture in your designated storage area.)

Note: The Zoom gauge will not be displayed when the Resolution setting is High.

Recording Videos

In addition to taking pictures, you can record, view, and send videos with your phone's built-in video camera.

- Highlight and press > Photos & Videos > Camcorder to activate video mode.
- Select Video Mail or Long Video.

Note: Video Mail can be at most 30 seconds in length, but the length of a Long Video is dependent on both the quality settings and storage type used (phone or memory card).

- 3. Using the phone's display screen as a viewfinder, aim the camera lens at your subject.
- Press or the side camera button to begin recording.
 - To return to camcorder mode to take another video, press
 .
- 5. Press , or the side camera button to stop recording. (Your phone automatically saves the video in your designated storage area.)
- 6. Press **OPTIONS** (right softkey) and select an option:
 - Send Video to send the video. (See "Sending Pictures and Videos" on page 104.)
 - Play to play the video.
 - Assign to assign the video as a video ringer or to voice calls.
 - Erase to delete the video.
 - Camcorder to return to camcorder mode.
 - Review Album to review all pictures and videos saved in the In Phone folder.

Video Mode Options

When the phone is in camcorder mode, press **OPTIONS** (right softkey) to display additional camcorder options:

- MODE to select a cameras mode: Camera or Camcorder. To switch to camera mode. (See "Taking Pictures" on page 97.)

Storage Options

- Highlight and press > Photos & Videos > Settings > Auto Save to.
- Select Phone or Card.

In Phone Folder

Your phone's internal storage area is called the **In Phone** folder. From the In Phone folder, you can view all the pictures and videos you have stored there, send items to your Places, delete files, and access additional options.

To review your stored pictures and videos in the In Phone folder:

- Highlight and press > Photos & Videos > My Photo & Videos > In Phone.
- 2. Use your navigation key to view and scroll through the pictures and videos.

microSD Picture and Video Folders

You can save pictures and videos directly to the microSD card using your phone's pictures and videos settings.

To review your stored pictures and videos on the microSD card:

Highlight and press > Photos & Videos > My Photo & Videos > Memory Card.

Use your navigation key to scroll through and view saved pictures and videos.

In Phone Folder and microSD Card Options

When you are viewing the In Phone folder or the memory Card folders, press **OPTIONS** (right softkey) to display the following options:

- Expand view/Thumbnail view to switch the display from expanded view to thumbnail view (up to nine pictures per screen).
- Play to play a selected video.
- Slide show to view all current folder images as an onscreen slideshow (only available when you save two or more pictures to the folder). Press left or right keys (or scroll over the navigation key) to skip or any other key to stop the slideshow.
- Select Multiple to select multiple images or videos.

- Press OPTIONS (right softkey), highlight Add/Change Attachment and press
- 5. Highlight an option and press

Choices include: My PC/Email, EA Tips and Tricks, MySpace, Snapfish, YouTube, Photobucket, and Facebook.





- Highlight and press > Photos & Videos > My Photo & Videos.
- Select a location (In Phone or Memory Card). (You will see the thumbnail pictures.)
- Press OPTIONS (right softkey) > Print... > PictBridge Print.
- Connect your phone to the PictBridge-enabled printer by using a USB cable (not included). (Wait until the connection is completed.)
- Set the printer settings using your navigation key. These settings can vary among bluetooth-capable printers.

Bluetooth is a short-range communications technology that allows you to connect wirelessly to a number of Bluetooth devices, such as headsets and hands-free car kits, and Bluetooth-enabled handhelds, computers, printers, and wireless phones. The Bluetooth communication range is usually up to approximately 30 feet.

Turning Bluetooth On and Off

By default, your device's Bluetooth feature is set to **Off**. Turning Bluetooth on makes your phone "discoverable" by other in-range Bluetooth devices.

To turn Bluetooth on:

- Highlight and press > Tools > Bluetooth > On/Off.
- 2. Highlight **On** and press **III** to enable Bluetooth.

To turn Bluetooth off:

- Highlight and press > Tools > Bluetooth > On/Off.
- 2. Highlight **Off** and press **III** to disable Bluetooth.

Bluetooth Status Indicators

The following icons show your Bluetooth connection status at a glance:



- Bluetooth is active
- Bluetooth is Visible (active and enabled)



 Bluetooth is visible and connected to a device or transferring data.



 Bluetooth is visible and connected to a Bluetooth headset.



 Bluetooth is active, connected and playing music via the Stereo Bluetooth Headset.

Using the Bluetooth Settings Menu

The **Bluetooth Settings** menu allows you to set up many of the characteristics of your phone's Bluetooth service, including:

- Entering or changing the name your phone uses for Bluetooth communication
- Setting your phone's visibility (or "discoverability") for other Bluetooth devices
- Displaying your phone's Bluetooth address

To access the Bluetooth Settings menu:

1. Highlight and press >Tools > Bluetooth.

- 2. Set your Bluetooth options.
 - Select Visibility > Hidden, Visible for 3 Min, or Always Visible to set your Bluetooth visibility.
 - Select My Bluetooth Info to display your phone's Bluetooth profiles and address.
 - Press EDIT (left softkey) to rename your phone for Bluetooth.
 - Select Trusted Devices to display your phone's current list of external trusted Bluetooth devices.

Pairing Bluetooth Devices

Paired Devices

The Bluetooth pairing process allows you to establish trusted connections between your phone and another Bluetooth device. When you pair devices, they share a passkey, allowing for fast, secure connections while bypassing the discovery and authentication process.

To pair your phone with another Bluetooth device:

Highlight and press > Tools > Bluetooth >
Add new. (Your phone will display a list of
discovered in-range Bluetooth devices.)

- Highlight a device and press . Different device categories are indicated by a different icon adiacent to the detected Bluetooth device.
- 3. Enter the passkey and press
- Enter a unique Device Name and press DONE (left softkey).

Note: Due to different specifications and features of other Bluetooth-compatible devices, display and operations may be different, and functions such as transfer or exchange may not be possible with all Bluetoothcompatible devices.

Pairing With a Computer

If you are going to be pairing with a computer's Bluetooth interface, you will need to allow the computer to initiate pairing with your phone.

To allow your phone to be paired with another Bluetooth device:

- Highlight and press > Tools > Bluetooth > Add new.
- 2. Select a Bluetooth device from the list showing an adjacent Computer icon.

3. Follow the onscreen prompts to enter your passkey and press ...

Sending Items via Bluetooth

Depending on your paired devices' settings and capabilities, you may be able to send pictures, Contacts information, or other items using a Bluetooth connection.

To send contacts information via Bluetooth:

- 1. Highlight and press > Contacts.
- Highlight an entry and press OPTIONS (right softkey) > Send Contact.
- Place a checkmark next to the Contact entry you want to send by first selecting an entry and pressing
- Press SEND CONTACTS (left softkey). (The phone begins searching for available Bluetooth devices. Bluetooth-capable phones will appear in the list with an adjacent phone icon.)
 - If the device isn't in the list, select OPTIONS (right softkey) > Refresh.

- From the list of Found Devices, highlight the target Bluetooth device and press SELECT (left softkey).
- Select Yes to confirm you want to send the contact. (The recipient's phone displays an onscreen message asking whether the person would like to receive and save your Contact entry to his or her list.)
- The recipient must either accept and save the contact, or reject the incoming data.

To send pictures via Bluetooth:

- Highlight and press > Photos & Videos > My Photos & Videos.
- 3. Select a picture by highlighting it and then pressing ...
- Press SEND (left softkey) > Bluetooth > Yes. (The phone begins searching for available Bluetooth devices. Bluetooth-capable phones will appear in the list with an adjacent phone icon.)

- 5. From the list of Found Devices, select the Bluetooth device and press ...
- Select Yes. (The recipient's phone displays an onscreen message asking whether the person would like to receive and save your Contact entry to his or her list.)
- The recipient must either accept and save the image, or reject the incoming data.

To send files via Bluetooth:

- Highlight and press > Tools > Mass
 Storage > File Manager.
- 2. Select a source location (Phone or Memory Card).
- 3. Highlight a file and press **OPTIONS** (right softkey).
- Select Send > Bluetooth.
- Select a file by highlighting it and then pressing to place a checkmark adjacent to the selected files.
- Press Done (left softkey).

- 7. Highlight a trusted Bluetooth device and press **SELECT** (left softkey).
- Select Yes to confirm the file transfer process. (The phone begins the transfer process.) The target Bluetooth device must accept the incoming file transfer to complete the delivery process.

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Voicemail

Setting Up Your Voicemail

Your phone automatically transfers all unanswered calls to your voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off. You should set up your Sprint Voicemail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated.

Always use a passcode to protect against unauthorized access.

- 1. Press and hold .
- 2. Follow the system prompts to:
 - Create your passcode.
 - Record your name announcement.
 - Record your greeting.

Note: Voicemail Passcode

Sprint strongly recommends that you create a passcode when setting up your voicemail to protect against unauthorized access. Without a passcode, anyone who has access to your phone is able to access your voicemail messages.

Voicemail Notification

There are several ways your phone alerts you to a new message:

- By displaying a message on the screen.
- By sounding the assigned ringer type.
- By the LED blinking red.
- By displaying at the top of your screen.

New Voicemail Message Alerts

When you receive a new voice message, your phone alerts you and prompts you to call your voicemail.

To call your voicemail:

To display your Missed Log:

▶ Highlight and press > Missed Alerts.

Note: When you are roaming off the Nationwide Sprint Network, you may not receive notification of new voicemail messages. Sprint recommends that you periodically check your voicemail by dialing 1 + area code + your wireless phone number. When your voicemail answers, press and enter your passcode. Roaming rates apply when you access voicemail while roaming off the Nationwide Sprint Network.

Your phone accepts messages even when it is turned off. However, your phone notifies you of new messages only when it is turned on and you are in a Sprint service area.

Retrieving Your Voicemail Messages

You can review your messages directly from your wireless phone or from any other touch-tone phone. To dial from your wireless phone, either speed dial your voicemail or use the menu keys.

Using One-Touch Message Access

- Press and hold (Your phone will dial your voicemail box.)
 - or –

From the lock screen, press LISTEN (left softkey)

Using the Menu Keys on Your Phone to Access Your Messages

- Highlight and press Messages > Voicemail > Call Voicemail.
 - or –

Select > Voicemail.

Note: You are charged for airtime minutes when you are accessing your voicemail from your wireless phone.

Using Another Phone to Access Messages

- 1. Dial your wireless phone number.
- 2. When your voicemail answers, press



Enter vour passcode.

Tip: When you call into voicemail, you first hear the header information (date, time, and sender information) for the message. To skip directly to the message, press 4 during the header.

Clearing the Message Icon

Your phone may temporarily continue to display the message icon after you have checked your voice and text messages.

- 1. Highlight and press > Messages > Voicemail > Clear Envelope.
- 2. Highlight **Yes** or **No** and press

Voicemail Key Guide

Here's a guick guide to your keypad functions while listening to voicemail messages.



Messaging (SMS/MMS)

With text and picture messaging (SMS/MMS), you can send and receive instant text and picture messages between your wireless phone and another messaging-ready phone. When you receive a new message, it will automatically display on your phone's screen.

In addition, text messaging includes a variety of preset messages, such as "I'm running late, I'm on my way," that make composing messages fast and easy. Use your phone to customize your own preset messages (up to 160 characters).

Tip: You can instantly access all your phone's messaging options, including text messaging, using the main screen carousel. See section 2B "Navigating the Main Screen" on page 42 for details.

Note: See your service plan for applicable charges for text messaging and SMS voice messaging.

Note: Creating messages can also be accessed from the Main Menu > Messages or by pressing on the QWERTY keyboard.

Composing Text/Picture Messages

- Select > Send Message > Message.
 - or –

Highlight and press Send Messages > Send Message.

– or –

Press Text on the QWERTY keyboard.

- 2. Select an entry method:
 - Go to Contacts to select a recipient from your Contacts. (Qualifying Contacts entries must contain a wireless phone number or an email address.)
 - or –

Press **MULTIPLE** (left softkey) to select more than one recipient and press ...

- or -

Press **NEW ADDR** (right softkey) to manually enter either a phone number or email address.

 Phone Number to use the keypad to enter a wireless phone number directly.

- Email Address to enter the recipient's email address.
- Press CONTINUE (left softkey) when you have finished entering recipients. (You may include up to 25 recipients per message.)
- Enter a message, use a preset message, or use smiley's/symbol.
 - To type a message, use your keypad to enter your message. Use the right softkey to select an input mode. (See "Entering Text in Portrait Mode" on page 31 or See "Entering Text in Landscape Mode" on page 35.)
 - Use the OPTIONS (right softkey) to select a Text Mode (such as Predictive Text, Smiley's, or Symbols).
 - To use a preset message, press OPTIONS (right softkey), select Add Preset Message, and then select a message and press
 - To use a smiley or symbol, press OPTIONS (right softkey) > Text Mode and select Smiley's or Symbols.

- 5. Add a picture, video, or voice message to a text message as an attachment:
 - Press OPTIONS (right softkey), highlight
 Add/Change Attachments and press
 - Select an attachment option and follow the onscreen prompts to select a file.
 - Options include: My album, Take new picture, Take new video, or Voice.
- Review your message and press SEND (left softkey) to deliver your message.

Accessing Text Messages

To read an SMS Text message:

When you receive a text message, you will see it on your phone's screen. Use your navigation key to scroll down and view the entire message.

To reply to a text message:

 While the message is open, press REPLY (left softkey).

- Compose your reply or use the preset messages or icons.
 - To type a message, use your keypad to enter your message. Use the right softkey to select an input mode. (See "Entering Text in Portrait Mode" on page 31 or See "Entering Text in Landscape Mode" on page 35.)

 - To use a Smiley or Symbol, press the right softkey, press OPTIONS > Text Mode > Smiley's or Symbols, highlight a selection and press ...
 - You may select additional messaging options by pressing OPTIONS (right softkey) > Mark as Urgent or Set Callback #.
- Review your reply and press SEND (left softkey) to deliver your message.

Preset Messages

Preset messages make it easy to compose text messages.

To add or edit preset messages:

- Highlight and press > Messages > Settings > Preset Messages > OPTIONS (right softkey) > Add New.
 - or -

Highlight a preset message and press **EDIT** (left softkey).

- Highlight a preset message and press **OPTIONS** (right softkey)> **Delete**.
- Enter your new message or changes and press (See "Entering Text in Portrait Mode" on page 31 or See "Entering Text in Landscape Mode" on page 35.)

Caller ID

Caller ID allows people to identify a caller before answering the phone by displaying the number of the incoming call. If you do not want your number displayed when you make a call, follow these steps.

1. Press *Shift EMMO ZPORS

- 2. Enter a phone number.
- 3. Press .

To permanently block your number, call Sprint Customer Service

Call Waiting

When you're on a call, Call Waiting alerts you to incoming calls by sounding two beeps. Your phone's screen informs you that another call is coming in and displays the caller's phone number (if it is available and you are in digital mode).

To respond to an incoming call while you're on a call:

Press . (This puts the first caller on hold and answers the second call.)

To switch back to the first caller:

Press again.

Tip: For those calls where you don't want to be interrupted, vou can temporarily disable Call Waiting by pressing before placing your call. Call Waiting is automatically reactivated once you end the call.

Making a 3-Way Call

With 3-Way Calling, you can talk to two people at the same time. When using this feature, the normal airtime rates will be charged for each of the two calls.

Enter a number and press



Important: It is recommended that the first line be active for at least 20 seconds prior to initiating a 3-way call with a second party.

- 2. Once you have established the connection, press OPTIONS (right softkey) > 3-way call.
- 3. Choose the second number by selecting one of the following:
 - Contacts to select a recipient from your Contacts (qualifying Contacts entries must contain a wireless phone number).
 - Highlight the entry and press



- Highlight the number (from the CONTACT) **DETAILS** page) and press
- · Highlight Call and press |

- Recent History to select a number from your Recent History entries.
 - Highlight the entry (from the RECENT HISTORY page) and press
 - Highlight the number or time entry and press
 - Highlight Call and press
- Enter phone number to use the keyboard to enter a wireless phone number directly.
 - Enter the phone number and press



4. When you're connected to the second party, press JOIN (right softkey) to begin your 3-way call.

If one of the people you called hangs up during your call, you and the remaining caller stay connected. If you initiated the call and are the first to hang up, all callers are disconnected.

Call Forwarding

Call Forwarding lets you forward all your incoming calls to another phone number – even when your phone is turned off. You can continue to make calls from your phone when you have activated Call Forwarding.

To activate Call Forwarding:

- 1. Press *Shift PRIS ZABC.
- 2. Enter the area code and phone number to which you want your calls forwarded.
- 3. Press . (You will see a message and hear a tone to confirm the activation of Call Forwarding.)

To deactivate Call Forwarding:

- 1. Press *Shift PORS 2 RBC PRES.
- 2. Press . (You will see a message and hear a tone to confirm the deactivation.)

Note: You are charged a higher rate for calls you have forwarded

Roaming

Roaming Icon

Your display screen always lets you know when you're off the Nationwide Sprint Network. Anytime you are roaming, the phone displays the roaming icon (). If you are roaming on a digital system, you will see the roaming icon along with the text - Digital Roam - .

Tip: Remember, when you are using your phone off the Nationwide Sprint Network, always dial numbers using 11 digits (1 + area code + number).

Roaming on Other Digital Networks

When you're roaming on digital networks, your call quality and security will be similar to the quality you receive when making calls on the Nationwide Sprint Network. However, you may not be able to access certain features, such as data services, depending on the available network.

Note: If you're on a call when you leave the Nationwide Sprint Network, your call is dropped. If your call is dropped in an area where you think Sprint service is available, turn your phone off and on again to reconnect to the network.

Checking for Voicemail Messages While Roaming

When you are roaming off the Nationwide Sprint Network, you may not receive on-phone notification of new voicemail messages.

Callers can still leave messages, but you will need to periodically check your voicemail for new messages if you are in a roaming service area for an extended period of time.

- 1. Dial 1 + area code + your phone number.
- 2. When you hear your voicemail greeting, press ____.
- Enter your passcode at the prompt and follow the voice prompts.

When you return to the Nationwide Sprint Network, voicemail notification will resume as normal.

Setting Roam Mode

Your phone allows you to control your roaming capabilities. By using the Roaming menu option, you can determine which signals your phone accepts.

Choose from three different settings on your dual-band phone to control your roaming experience.

Highlight and press > Settings > Others > Roaming > Set Mode.

- 2. Highlight an option and press
- s 🔲.
 - Automatic to seek service on the Nationwide Sprint Network. When Sprint service is unavailable, the phone searches for an alternate system.
 - Sprint Only to access only the Nationwide Sprint Network and prevent roaming on other networks.

Call Guard

Your phone has two ways of alerting you when you are roaming off the Nationwide Sprint Network: the onscreen roaming icon and Call Guard. Call Guard makes it easy to manage your roaming by requiring an extra step before you can place or answer a roaming call. (This additional step is not required when you make or receive calls while on the Nationwide Sprint Network.)

To turn Call Guard on or off:

- Highlight and press > Settings > Others > Roaming > Call Guard.
- 2. Highlight On or Off and press

Note: Call Guard is turned on by default on your phone.

Voice dialing and speed dialing are not available when you are roaming with Call Guard enabled.

To place roaming calls with Call Guard on:

- 1. From standby mode, dial 1 + area code + the seven-digit number and press .
- 2. Press to send a call.

To answer incoming roaming calls with Call Guard on:

- 1. Press . (A message will be displayed notifying you that roaming charges will apply.)
- 2. Press to complete the call.

Note: If the Call Guard feature is set to On, you need to take extra steps to make and receive roaming calls.

Data Roam Guard

Depending on service availability and roaming agreements, your phone may be able to access data services while roaming on certain digital systems.

You can set your phone to alert you when you are roaming off the Nationwide Sprint Network and try to use data services such as messaging.

Note: Data Roam Guard is turned off by default on your phone.

To set your Data Roam Guard notification:

- Highlight and press > Settings > Others > Roaming > Data Roam Guard.
- 2. Highlight an option and press
 - Always Ask sets your phone's Data Roam Guard feature on. You will see a prompt and will be required to respond anytime you access data services while roaming.
 - Never Ask turns your phone's Data Roam Guard feature off. You will not be notified of your roaming status when accessing data services.

To use data services when Data Roam Guard is active:

When a pop-up notification appears informing you that data roam charges may apply, press ROAM (left softkey) to connect.

Getting Started With Data Services

With your Sprint service, you are ready to start enjoying the advantages of data services. This section will help you learn the basics of using your data services, including managing your user name, launching a data connection, and navigating the Web with your phone.

Your User Name

When you buy your phone and sign up for service, you're automatically assigned a user name, which is typically based on your name and a number, followed by "@sprintpcs.com." (For example, the third John Smith to sign up for Sprint data services might have jsmith003@sprintpcs.com as his user name.)

When you use data services, your user name is submitted to identify you to the Nationwide Sprint Network. Your user name will be automatically programmed into your phone. You don't have to enter it.

Finding Your User Name

If you aren't sure what your user name is, you can easily find it online or on your phone.

- At www.sprint.com. Sign on to your account using your phone number and password. To display your user name, click on the Settings & Passwords menu, then under the Account Admin Tools column, click on Phone Labels > Username.
- On your phone, highlight and press > Settings > Phone Information > Phone Number/User ID.

Updating Your User Name

If you choose to change your user name and select a new one online, you must then update the user name on your phone.

► Highlight and press Settings > Others > Data > Update Data Profile. (To cancel, press before completing the update.)

Launching a Web Connection

► Select ⊕ > Home.

– or –

Highlight ♠ and press ► > Web. (Your data connection starts and you see the SprintWebSM home page.)

- or -

Press Web on the QWERTY keyboard.

Note: If Net Guard is enabled and displayed, press ROAM (left softkey) to continue and launch the Web. For more information, see "Net Guard" on page 60.

Tip: For instant access to the Internet, including the Sprint home page, Favorites, Recent Pages, and Google search, use the main screen carousel. See section 2B "Navigating the Main Screen" on page 42 for details.

While connecting, you may see an animation and a "Connecting" message.

The SprintWeb[™] Home Page



Note: The default view for the Browser window is to show the page at full screen with only the GO/STOP and TOOLBAR buttons visible.

Tip: To change the default launch page to the last page you viewed, press TOOLBAR (right softkey) > OPTIONS > Set as Homepage.

Data Connection Status and Indicators

Your phone displays the current status of your data connection through indicators at the top of the screen. The following symbols are used:



Your data connection is active (data is being transferred). When the triangles are animated, your phone is transferring data (for example, when you are opening a Web page); when the triangles are gray, your phone is connected to the network but is not currently transferring data (for example, when you are viewing a Web page that is completely open). In either state, you can receive incoming calls.



Your data connection is dormant (no data is being sent or received. When the arrows are gray, your phone is connected to the network but is not currently transferring data. Though not currently active, when dormant the phone can restart an active connection quickly; voice calls can be made and received.

If you do not see an indicator, your phone does not have a current data connection. To launch a connection, see "Launching a Web Connection" on page 128.

Data Restrictions

Parental Controls determine what features you have access to on your phone. (See "Using Parental Controls" on page 60.)

When you first connect to the Web, access is confirmed against the current Parental Restrictions. If data access has been restricted, you will be notified with an onscreen warning. This feature helps prevent any accidental data connections. You can disable the data restriction feature by changing the setting from within the Parental Controls menu.

Note: To access Parental Controls, the feature must first be active (page 60).

To change your Restriction settings:

- 1. Highlight and press Settings > Parental Controls > On/Off
- 2. Select either:
 - On to activate the Parental Control function.
 - Off to deactivate the Parental Control function.
- Select Restrictions > CONTINUE (right softkey) and change your settings.

Navigating the Web

Navigating through menus and websites during a data session is easy once you've learned a few basics. Here are some tips for getting around:

Softkeys

During a data session, the bottom line of your phone's display contains one or more softkeys. These keys are shortcut controls for navigating around the Web, and they correspond to the softkeys directly below the phone's display screen.

Tip: Depending on which websites you visit, the labels on the softkeys may change to indicate their function.

To use softkeys:

Press a softkey. (If you see an additional pop-up menu when you press the softkey, select the menu items using your keypad [if they're numbered], or by highlighting the option and pressing...)



Landscape Mode

Tip: Pressing jumps to the top of the Web page.

Pressing jumps to the bottom of the Web page.

Browser Menu

Although the home page offers a broad and convenient array of sites and services for you to browse, not all sites are represented, and certain functions, such as going directly to specific websites, are not available. For these and other functions, you will need to use the browser menu. The browser menu offers additional options to expand your use of the Web on your phone.

The browser menu or toolbar may be opened anytime you have an active data session, from any page you are viewing.

To open the browser menu:

- 1. Select ⊕ > Home.
 - or –
 - Highlight and press > Web.
- Select an existing Web page icon from the listing or enter an address manually at the top of the page within the search field.



- Select TOOLBAR from the bottom right to view the browser menu.
- 4. Select an available icon to launch and option:
 - MY HOMEPAGE (returns the browser to the SprintWebSM home page.
 - MY PAGES () accesses your favorite and recently viewed Web pages.
 - SPRINT SEARCH (Q) launches the Google[®] search engine.

- **OPTIONS** () accesses the Browser options:
 - Set as Homepage assigns the current Web page as your new homepage.
 - Font size allows use of a slider to adjust the current text size displayed within the browser.
 Touch Save to store your new setting.
 - Send this page to... copies the current Web address and attaches it to an outgoing text message.
 - Clear private data allows you to delete the current browsing history, browser cache, cookies, and stored passwords.
 - Help provides help information related to the Browser.
 - Advanced allows you to access additional Browser menu options such as: Icon Row, Startup page, Page info, Images on/off, Reset browser, Turn on error logging, Send referrer, Redirect prompt, and Reset browser settings.

Scrolling

As with other parts of your phone's menu, you'll have to scroll up and down to see everything on some websites.

To scroll line by line through websites:

- Scroll over the navigation key in an up or down direction.
 - or -

Press the keyboard's up or down directional keys.

See "Navigating Through the Menus" on page 19.

To scroll page by page through websites:

Press the volume buttons on the side of the phone.

Selecting

Once you've learned how to use softkeys and scroll, you can start navigating the Web.

To select onscreen items:

▶ Use the navigation key to highlight an item, and then press the left softkey (or press ...).

Tip: You'll find that the left softkey is used primarily for selecting items. This softkey is often labeled "OK."

If the items on a page are numbered, you can use your keypad (number keys) to select an item.

Links, which are displayed as underlined text, allow you to jump to Web pages, select special functions, or even place phone calls.

To select links:

Highlight the link and press the appropriate softkey.

Entering Text Into a Search or Text Field

Select an onscreen text field or Search field to display the text input screen.

Going Back

To go back one page:

Press the key on your phone.

Note: You can also use the Solvey for deleting text (like the Back key.)

Going Home

To return to the home page from any other page:

Press **TOOLBAR** (right softkey) and select



Reloading the Web Page

From a currently active Web page, select (The browser will reload the current page.



Restarting the Web Browser

If the Web browser seems to be malfunctioning or stops responding, you can usually fix the problem by simply restarting the browser.

- Select ⊕ > Home.
 - or -

Highlight and press

- or -

Press web on the QWERTY keyboard.

Going to a Specific Website

To go to a particular website address by entering a URL:

- 1. Select ⊕ > Home.
 - or -
 - Highlight and press > Web.
 - or -
 - Press web on the QWERTY keyboard.

Data Services FAQs

How will I know when my phone is ready for data service? Your user name (for example, <u>bsmith01@sprintpcs.com</u>) will be displayed when you access <u>Menu > Settings > Phone Information > Phone Number/User ID.</u>

How do I sign in for the first time?

You are automatically signed in to access data services when you turn on your phone.

How do I know when my phone is connected to data services?

Your phone automatically connects when you use data service or an incoming message arrives. You will also see the $\frac{1}{2}$ or $\frac{1}{2}$ indicator.

Can I make calls and use data services at the same time? You cannot use voice and data services

simultaneously. If you receive a call while data service is active, your phone forwards the call to voicemail. You can place an outgoing call anytime, but it will interrupt any in-progress data session.

When is my data connection active?

Your connection is active when data is being transferred. Outgoing calls are allowed; incoming calls go directly to voicemail. When active, the for a simulation on the display screen.

When is my data connection dormant?

If your phone receives no data for 10 seconds, the connection goes dormant. When the connection is dormant, you can make and receive voice calls. (The connection may become active again quickly.) If your phone receives no data for an extended period, the connection will terminate.

Can I sign out of data services?

You can sign out without turning off your phone; however, you will not be able to browse the Web or use other data services. While signed out, you can still place or receive phone calls, check voicemail, and use other voice services. You may sign in again at any time. To sign out, go to Settings > Others > Data > On/Off > Disable Sprint Data Services in your phone's menu.

- Navigate around by either scrolling up over your navigation key or using your keyboard's directional keys and press the channel icon to view the current channel from the Sprint TV listings or to select an available category. Current channel will continue to play on top till you select another channel.

TV FAQs

1. Will I know if I'm receiving an incoming call while I'm viewing or listening to a media clip?
Yes. All incoming calls will stop the Sprint TV app and provide you with the option to either SILENCE (left softkey) or IGNORE (right softkey). The Sprint TV application will start from beginning after rejecting or ending the call. All interruptions such as a new message / Voicemail / Alarm / Calendar notifications stops the Sprint TV app and provides you with the corresponding notification. The Sprint TV application will start from beginning after returning back from the notifications.

- 2. How long are the clips? Will I know the estimated time it will take to play the clip prior to accessing it? Once you have selected a channel, you will see a listing of the available clips, with each clip's length displayed after the clip's title. In general, a clip's duration will depend on the story or content being provided, and can be fairly short or as long as a few minutes.
- 3. Can I access a clip wherever I am, as long as I have my phone? As long as you are on the Nationwide Sprint Network, you will have access to the audio and video clips.

Note: Sprint TV service does not work while roaming off of the Nationwide Sprint Network or where service is unavailable.

4. Are the videos that I'm viewing "live" videos? It depends on the content provider. Some of the channels available through Sprint TV stream live content. Others provide media on demand with video and audio clips that are refreshed throughout the day, but that are not "live."

- 5. After purchasing access to an Available Channel for a monthly fee, do I receive any confirmation? That is, how do I know it has been purchased? The next time you access the channel, you bypass the Preview/Purchase page and go directly to the available content.
- If I don't subscribe to a data plan, will I still be able to view the multimedia clips?
 Yes. For service access charges, please consult your Sprint service plan or visit www.sprint.com.
- 7. What does it mean when the video pauses and I see the word "loading" at the bottom of the screen? This happens when the phone is loading the data necessary to play the clip. It typically occurs when there is heavy traffic on the network.
- 8. How can I cancel service if I decide I don't want it? To cancel your Sprint TV service, visit www.sprint.com and sign on to My Sprint with your account number and password. From this page, you have the ability to cancel the service or any channels to which you subscribe.

9. If I put on my stereo headset and insert it into the phone's headset jack, can I close the phone while I am playing an audio (or video) clip without interrupting the clip?

Yes. When you insert your stereo headset into the phone's headset jack, the phone automatically goes into "headset mode," allowing you to close the phone and continue playing the clip. (Likewise, if your phone is in "headset mode," a phone call will not disconnect when you close the phone.)

10. Can I surf to a different channel while I am playing a clip?

Yes. While you are playing a clip, you can use the up and down navigation keys to surf to a different channel. You will see a small pop-up screen that tells you which channel you are watching as well as other channels that you have access to. Use the navigation keys to scroll through the different channels. Once you find a channel that you want to watch, scroll to it and press (or simply wait approximately three seconds), and the channel will begin loading.

Music - Sprint Music Store

The Sprint Music Store lets you purchase and download digital music files to play on your phone or computer.

Note: A microSD memory card must be inserted in the phone prior to using the Sprint Music function.

Accessing the Sprint Music Store

Note: With a formatted microSD card, there are no default folders created. Upon access to the Music Player, the Music/Tone folders are also created.

Purchasing and Downloading Music

Now that you're in the store, you can shop for songs to purchase and download to your phone's microSD card.

- From the Sprint Music Store opening page, press Menu (right softkey) and select Store Search to browse the store. Other options include:
 - Home to navigate to the music store home page.
 - Now Playing to display the information on the current file being played.
 - My Library displays a list of your currently available music files.
 - Store Search gives you the option of searching for specific songs or artists. Just use your keypad to enter your search criteria in the available field.

- 2. Highlight a song and press . (You will see the song information screen.)
- 3. Highlight an option and press
 - Preview to play an audio clip of the selected song.
 - Buy Song to purchase the song and download it to your phone's microSD card.
 - When you select **Buy Song**, the file will download to your phone's microSD card. (If there is no microSD card installed or if there is not enough free memory space on the card, you will see an alert.)
 - Once the song has been downloaded to your microSD card, you will see options allowing you to listen to the song, add it to a playlist, or continue shopping.

Playing Music From the Sprint Music Store

The Sprint Music Store not only gives you access to great music, it also gives you a place to listen to and organize your music library.

Accessing the Music Player

 From the Sprint Music Store opening page, press Menu (right softkey) and select My Library.

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- If prompted, highlight Update My Library and press to re-index your microSD card's Music folder and list all available music files.
- 2. Highlight My Library and press .
- 3. Make your selection based on category types or use the Search field to look for a specific music file.

Accessing the Music Player Configuration

- Launch the Sprint Music Store application. (Highlight and press > Entertainment > Music.)
- From the Sprint Music Store opening page, press Menu (right softkey) and select My Library.
 - Select Update My Library and press OK to update the content of your current library (if new material was recently added).



- 3. Select a category.
- Highlight a file and press to play the selected song.

- From the Player display, press Menu (right softkey) and select an option:
 - View Tracklist display information for the currently playing song.
 - Add to Playlist inserts the current song into a previously created playlist.
 - Switch shuffle on/off toggles the activity state of the shuffle feature that randomly selects different songs from your currently available music files.
 - Switch repeat on/off toggles the activity state of the repeat function that repeats the current song once completed.
 - Delete Track to delete the track from your current list of available music files. From the confirmation screen, press OK (left softkey) to confirm deletion or CANCEL (right softkey) to quit this operation.
 - Exit to exit the music player application.

To create a playlist:

- From the My Library screen, select Playlists > Create Mobile Playlist. > Add Tracks.
- From the ALL TRACKS screen, select the songs you want to add to the new playlist.

Press DONE (right softkey) to complete the creation process and return to the MY MOBILE PLAYLIST screen.

Backing Up Your Downloaded Music Files

Sprint recommends you back up your downloaded music files to your computer. Although the downloaded files can only be played on your phone and on your account, backing them up to your computer lets you access the files in case your microSD card is lost or damaged, or if you install a new microSD card. See "Connecting Your Phone to Your Computer" on page 95.

- Connect your phone using a USB cable or the built-in connection on Bluetooth-enabled phones.
- Use your computer to navigate to the microSD card's Music folder.
- Select and copy the music files to a folder on your computer's hard drive.

Note: Although you can store purchased and downloaded music files on your computer, they will only be playable on your phone and on your account.

If you copy the files to a new microSD card, you will need to create a folder on the card called "Music" to be able to play the music files.

Multitasking


Multitasking is a way of maintaining one application active while using another. While your current music selection is playing, you can activate the Application Manager screen and choose from a list of available applications which can be run in tandem with your music.

To multitask on your phone:

- Launch the Sprint Music Store application. (Highlight and press > Entertainment > Music.)
- 2. From the Sprint Music Store opening page, press **Menu** (right softkey) and select **My Library**.

- Highlight a file and press to play the selected song.
- Press to exit the Music Store application without closing it and launch the popup menu, where you can choose from the following options: Resume, Exit, App.Manager, and Send to Background.
 - If you press from the DO YOU WANT TO EXIT screen, the phone will reactivate the song's playback screen and resume playback.
- 5. Highlight App. Manager and press to launch an Application Manager screen which provides you access to several applications:
 - Application Manager manages all currently active applications. With your music still playing, the Sprint Music Store entry appears in the list.

- Press **OPTIONS** (right softkey) to access the following management options:
 - Bring to Foreground reactivates the current application screen. For example, if your music is currently playing in the background, selecting this option activates the Player tab with the song displayed.



- **Exit Application** terminates the currently selected application and returns you to the standby screen.
- Exit All Background terminates all currently active applications and returns you to the standby screen.
- Launch New App allows you to launch an application from the My Stuff listing.

Receiving an Incoming Call While Playing Music

An incoming call pauses the currently playing music file while the phone call is active. Once you end the call, the paused music resumes playing automatically.)

Answer an incoming call by highlighting
 Answer and pressing

– or –



Press .

2. When you are done with your call, press .

end the call. The previously paused application then resumes.

Note: When placing an outgoing call, the Application Manager pauses your current music playback and allows you to proceed with your outgoing call. When you end the call, the Application Manager restarts the music playback. If the phone is running more than one simultaneous application (such as **Music Store**, **Application** [from **My Stuff**], and **Games**), the user interface can begin to slow down and result in music or sound interruptions.

To solve this type of issue, it is best to close down all other applications (highlight and press > My Stuff > Application Manager > Options > Exit All Background) before initiating a new application.

Also, in some situations, the camera or camcorder may have limited functionality or become unavailable. For example, if you were currently playing music (via the Music Store), or playing a game in the background, and then wanted take a photo, the phone may prompt you with a "CPU Low, Kill the Application" dialog.

This indicates that the current phone resources are low and you should terminate one of the current applications before continuing. Refer to the procedure above to exit either a specific application or all current applications, and then launch the camera or camcorder again.

Streaming Music

In addition to the Sprint Music Store, Sprint offers a variety of musical options through the Music category in the Sprint TV menu, including SIRIUS Music, Music Choice, VH1, and many others. Choose from rock, pop, hip-hop, and R&B, and access exclusive video clips, music industry news, performances, and interviews with your favorite artists.

- Highlight and press Sprint TV > Radio > [selection].
 - The keyboard directional keys (up/down/left/right) are best suited for navigation around this screen and among the various stations.
 - To make a selection using the keyboard, highlight an station and press forter.

Note: If a streaming type (TV, Radio, etc.) can not be selected via the directional arrows, scroll using the navigation key.

- Select Preview to see and hear a preview of your selected channel (if available).
 - or -

Select **Subscribe** to purchase a monthly subscription to your selected channel.

- Once you have purchased access to a music or radio channel, you can select from a variety of stations to listen to your favorite music or get caught up on what's new in music.
- From the station preview window you can choose from several onscreen options:
 - Information to display station information.
 - Channel listing to display the available channel listing at the bottom of the current preview window
 - Add to favorites to add the current station to your favorites list.
 - Scale to rescale the current song album art.

GPS Services

Your phone's built-in GPS capability gives you access to a number of location-based services, including **Sprint Navigation** and **Sprint Family Locator**.

Activating Location Mode

Before using any of the location-based services, you must turn on your phone's location mode.

- 1. Highlight and press Settings > Location. (You will see the Location disclaimer.)
- 2. Read the disclaimer and press **OK** (left softkey).
- 3. Highlight On and press
- Press DONE (left softkey) to complete the process.

Sprint Navigation

Sprint Navigation gives you turn-by-turn directions onscreen and over speakerphone.

Note: Depending on your service plan, Sprint Navigation may require a monthly subscription. Contact Sprint for information and pricing.

Note: Some features may be available only with a subscription to Sprint Navigation Premium.

Registering Sprint Navigation

Before you can use Sprint Navigation, your phone and service must be registered.

- Highlight and press > Maps > Sprint Navigation.
 - or -
 - Select > Drive To.
- Read the onscreen terns and Conditions and press Accept (right softkey) to agree to these terms of service.
- Follow the onscreen instructions to enter and submit the required information.

Using Sprint Navigation

- Highlight and press > Maps > Sprint Navigation.
- 2. Select an option and follow the onscreen instructions to get directions or view maps.
 - Drive To lets you enter an address (vocally or using the keypad) or select from categories such as:
 - My Favorites: user-defined favorite locations.
 - · Recent Places: recently entered locations.
 - · Address: manually entered street addresses.

- Intersection: used to locate a specific address by using two separate street addresses to identify an intersection.
- City: used when you do not know a physical address but would like driving directions to a city.
- Business: locations based on business categories.
- Airport: local airports based on current GPS location.
- Search lets you search for locations based on Name, Category, or Location. You can choose
 Type it or Speak it to begin your search.
 - Category entries include options such as Food/Coffee, Gas Stations, Gas by Price, Banks/ATMs, WiFi Spots, Parking Lots, Hotels & Motels, and Movie Theaters.
- Maps & Traffic lets you view maps and get traffic information for your current location or for any other location (same categories as Drive To).

Share & More offers additional options, such as sharing your location with contacts, creating and storing My Favorites locations, accessing the product tour, and setting detailed application preferences.

Sprint Family Locator

Sprint Family Locator uses GPS technology to locate your child's phone and display the location on an interactive map.

Signing Up for Sprint Family Locator

- 1. Highlight and press > Maps > Sprint Family Locator.
- 2. Follow the onscreen instructions to enter and submit the required information.

Using Sprint Family Locator

- Highlight and press Maps > Sprint amily Locator.
- 2. Enter the parent phone number and password to sign in to your account.
- Select a phone to locate from the available child phone list.

Getting Driving Directions

The built-in GPS hardware (when enabled) allows you to get driving directions to selected locations or establishments based on your current location.


Using a Physical Address

- 1. Highlight and press > Maps > Sprint Navigation > Drive To.

 - Select > Drive To.
- 2. Highlight Address and press
- 3. Highlight **Type It** and press
 - Type It requires that you enter the physical address using either the keypad or keyboard.
 - Speak It to place a call to the TeleNav[™] operator where you will speak the desired address. This is similar to calling 411 for directory assistance. (A fee may be incurred.)
- 4. If typing in the address, enter the following:
 - Address: used to enter a specific address by using a number, street name, and city/state or zip code.
 - City: used when you do not know a physical address but would like driving directions to a city.

- As you enter in the text, a list of possible city matches appears onscreen. Use your navigation key to choose one and press
- State, ZIP or Country used when the specific address information is not available but you would like to provide some general driving parameters.

To search nearby locations based on type:

- 3. Enter the physical address information. See "Using a Physical Address" on page 165.
- Press Options (right softkey) > Search Along and press . This allows you to then search for a location based on a name, location, or category such as Food/Coffee. etc.
 - See "Using a Local Business Category" on page 167.

Using a Local Business Category

The Restore™ can also cross-reference your current location with local business and points of interest, such as Grocery Stores, Gas Stations, Wi-Fi Spots, Malls, Hospitals, etc.

- 2. Highlight Business and press

 - What lets you use a keyword search for your business.

- Where returns you to the Search Near page where you can choose from a set of seven location categories.
 - Entries with more than one available category (a subcategory) appear with an adjacent gray arrow. These entries can be expanded and then closed.

To organize and arrange your search results:

- Select a category entry from the Search page. By default the Search Results page lists the Best Matches based on closest location first (top).
- 2. Highlight an onscreen location and press |



- 3. Press **Options** (right softkey) to apply the available filter options to best display the matching results:
 - Map Results: overlaps your current list over a map of your current location. The numeric onscreen entries correspond to your current sorted list.
 - Sort by Relevance: sorts a list of matching results by placing the most likely match (to your present search criteria) at the top and least likely at the bottom.

 More Results: sorts the results by additional criteria.

To search for the least expensive gas in your area:

- Select a grade of gasoline: Any, Regular, Plus 89, Premium, or Diesel.

- With the destination information onscreen, press Options (right softkey) and select Drive To to be provided with a new route to the selected gas station.

Note: Only Contact entry numbers that are associated to a Mobile profile are allowed to receive this address information. The target phone number must be assigned to a Mobile profile.

Configuring Your Navigation Preferences

Highlight and press Maps > Sprint Navigation > Share & More > Preferences.

- or -

Select > Share & More > Preferences.

- Scroll down the list and select an entry to change its current setting:
 - General: allows you to configure application settings such as:
 - My Name: allows you to alter the current first and last name registered with the service.
 - Region: allows you to select your current region. Default: North America.
 - Language: allows you to change the language currently used for announcements. Default is English (US).
 - Distance Units: allows you to alter the descriptions used for distances: Miles/Feet (Miles/Feet) or Kilometers/Meters.

- Help Card: allows you to configure the settings for the onscreen help message (card).
 Options include: Always On or Always Off.
- Exit after (minutes): turns the application off after there has been no activity for 20 minutes.
- Map Colors: allows you to configure the appearance of the onscreen map. Options include: Auto, Daytime, or Nighttime.
- Init Volume: allows you to assign the initial default volume level for the audio readout.
 Options include: Normal, Very Soft, Soft, Loud, and Very Loud.
- Navigation: allows you to configure navigationrelated parameters such as:
 - Route Style: allows you to choose the method which is used to provide you directions from Point A to Point B. The default is Fastest route. Choose from one of the following options: Fastest, Shortest, Prefer Streets, Prefer Highway, Pedestrian, or Ask me each trip.
 - Avoid: allows you to specify those in-route obstacles that should be avoided during configuration of the best route. Options include: HOV Lanes, Tolls, and Traffic Delays.

- Moving Maps: allows you to select the default map type displayed for your navigation: 3D Moving Maps or 2D Moving Maps.
- Backlight: allows you to configure the Backlight setting between On, Off, or On at Turns.
- Traffic Alerts: allows you to either enable (On) or disable (Off) real-time traffic alerts along your current route.
- Navigation Audio: allows you to choose whether the street names are announced during your navigation.
 - Settings: allows you to configure the level of audio detail given for directions. Options include: Full Audio, Instructions Only, or No Audio.
 - Guide Tone: allows you to configure a voice type of the audio readout. Options include Sara(English) or Maria(Spanish).

- Speech Input: allows you to configure how the application handles spoken input into the system.
 - Input Method (available with Sprint Navigation Premium): to enter input data into the system.
 Options are Speak In Directly or Call In.
 - Address Input: to determine how address data is input into the system. Options are Always Ask, Always Speak In, or Always Type In.
 - Search Input: to determine how search data is input into the system. Options are Always Ask, Always Speak In, or Always Type In.
- Opt-in Features (available with Sprint Navigation Premium): allows you to enable/disable additional customer deals/offers. Options are: Messages from Merchant, Deals, Menu, or Sponsored Results.

This phone guide contains important operational and safety information that will help you safely use your phone. Failure to read and follow the information provided in this phone guide may result in serious bodily injury, death, or property damage.

General Precautions

There are several simple guidelines to operating your phone properly and maintaining safe, satisfactory service.

- To maximize performance, do not touch the bottom portion of your phone where the internal antenna is located while using the phone.
- Speak directly into the mouthpiece.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills. If your phone does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery.
- Do not expose your phone to direct sunlight for extended periods of time (such as on the dashboard of a car).
- Although your phone is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending, or sitting on it.
- Any changes or modifications to your phone not expressly approved in this document could void your warranty for this equipment and void your authority to operate this equipment.

Note: For the best care of your phone, only Sprint-authorized personnel should service your phone and accessories. Failure to do so may be dangerous and void your warranty.

Maintaining Safe Use of and Access to Your Phone

Do Not Rely on Your Phone for Emergency Calls

Mobile phones operate using radio signals, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore you should never rely solely upon any mobile phone for essential communication (e.g., medical emergencies). Emergency calls may not be possible on all cellular networks or when certain network services or mobile phone features are in use. Check with your local service provider for details.

Using Your Phone While Driving

Talking on your phone while driving (or operating the phone without a hands-free device) is prohibited in some jurisdictions. Laws vary as to specific restrictions. Remember that safety always comes first.

Tip: Purchase an optional hands-free accessory at your local Sprint Store, or call Sprint at 1-866-866-7509. You can also dial # 2 2 2 on your phone.

Following Safety Guidelines

To operate your phone safely and efficiently, always follow any special regulations in a given area. Turn your phone off in areas where use is forbidden or when it may cause interference or danger.

Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, RF signals from wireless phones may affect inadequately shielded electronic equipment.

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic operating systems or entertainment systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or their representative to determine if these systems are adequately shielded from external RF signals. Also check with the manufacturer regarding any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Consult the manufacturer of any personal medical devices, such as pacemakers and hearing aids, to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF signals.

Note: Always turn off the phone in healthcare facilities, and request permission before using the phone near medical equipment.

Turning Off Your Phone Before Flying

Turn off your phone before boarding any aircraft. To prevent possible interference with aircraft systems, the U.S. Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations require you to have permission from a crew member to use your phone while the plane is on the ground. To prevent any risk of interference, FCC regulations prohibit using your phone while the plane is in the air.

Turning Off Your Phone in Dangerous Areas

To avoid interfering with blasting operations, turn your phone off when in a blasting area or in other areas with signs indicating two-way radios should be turned off. Construction crews often use remote-control RF devices to set off explosives.

Turn your phone off when you're in any area that has a potentially explosive atmosphere. Although it's rare, your phone and accessories could generate sparks. Sparks can cause an explosion or fire, resulting in bodily injury or even death. These areas are often, but not always, clearly marked. They include:

- Fueling areas such as gas stations.
- Below deck on boats.
- Fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities.
- Areas where the air contains chemicals or particles such as grain, dust, or metal powders.
- Any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle's engine.

Note: Never transport or store flammable gas, flammable liquids, or explosives in the compartment of your vehicle that contains your phone or accessories.

Restricting Children's Access to Your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Do not allow children to play with it as they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone or make calls that increase your Sprint invoice.

Please Note the Following Information When Using Your Handset

1. WARNING REGARDING DISPLAY

The display on your handset is made of glass or acrylic and could break if your handset is dropped or if it receives significant impact. Do not use if screen is broken or cracked as this could cause injury to you.

2. WARRANTY DISCLAIMER: PROPER USE OF A TOUCH SCREEN HANDSET

If your handset has a touchscreen display, please note that a touchscreen responds best to a light touch from the pad of your finger or a non-metallic stylus. Using excessive force or a metallic object when pressing on the touchscreen may damage the tempered glass surface and void the warranty. For more information, please refer to the "Manufacturer's Warranty" on page 182.

Using Your Phone With a Hearing Aid Device

A number of Sprint phones have been tested for hearing aid device compatibility. When some wireless phones are used with certain hearing devices (including hearing aids and cochlear implants), users may detect a noise which can interfere with the effectiveness of the hearing device.

Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and phones also vary in the amount of interference noise they may generate. ANSI standard C63.19 was developed to provide a standardized means of measuring both wireless phone and hearing devices to determine usability rating categories for both.

Ratings have been developed for mobile phones to assist hearing device users find phones that may be compatible with their hearing device. Not all phones have been rated for compatibility with hearing devices. Phones that have been rated have a label located on the box. Your SPH-M570 has an M4 and T3 rating.

These ratings are not guarantees. Results will vary depending on the user's hearing device and individual type and degree of hearing loss. If a hearing device is particularly vulnerable to interference noise; even a phone with a higher rating may still cause unacceptable noise levels in the hearing device. Trying out the phone with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs.

M-Ratings: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements for hearing aid compatibility and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than unrated phones. (M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.)

T-Ratings: Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to be more usable with a hearing device's telecoil ("T Switch"or "Telephone Switch") than unrated phones. (T4 is the

better/higher of the two ratings. Note that not all hearing devices have telecoils in them.)

Note: New Technologies, Including Wi-Fi
This phone has been tested and rated for use with hearing
aids for some of the wireless technologies that it uses. However,
there may be newer wireless technologies (Including Wi-Fi)
used in this phone that have not been tested for use with
hearing aids.

Hearing aid devices may also be measured for immunity to interference noise from wireless phones and should have ratings similar to phones. Ask your hearing healthcare professional for the rating of your hearing aid. Add the rating of your hearing aid and your phone to determine probable usability:

- Any combined rating equal to or greater than six offers excellent use.
- Any combined rating equal to five is considered normal use.
- Any combined rating equal to four is considered usable.

Thus, if you pair an M3 hearing aid with an M3 phone, you will have a combined rating of six for "excellent use." This is synonymous for T ratings.

Sprint further suggests you experiment with multiple phones (even those not labeled M3/T3 or M4/T4) while in the store to find the one that works best with your hearing aid device. Should you experience interference or find the quality of service unsatisfactory after purchasing your phone, promptly return it to the store within 30 days of purchase. (A restocking

Getting the Best Hearing Device Experience With Your Phone

To further minimize interference:

- Set the phone's display and keypad backlight settings to ensure the minimum time interval:
 - Highlight and press > Settings > Display > Backlight Control > Backlight Dim or Backlight Off.
 - 2. Highlight the minimum time interval setting and press ...
- Position the phone so the internal antenna is farthest from your hearing aid.
- Move the phone around to find the point with least interference.

Caring for the Battery

Protecting Your Battery

The guidelines listed below help you get the most out of your battery's performance.

- Recently there have been some public reports of wireless phone batteries overheating, catching fire, or exploding. It appears that many, if not all, of these reports involve counterfeit or inexpensive, aftermarket-brand batteries with unknown or questionable manufacturing standards. Sprint is not aware of similar problems with Sprint phones resulting from the proper use of batteries and accessories approved by Sprint or the manufacturer of your phone. Use only Sprint-approved or manufacturer-approved batteries and accessories found at Sprint Stores or through your phone's manufacturer, or call 1-866-866-7509 to order. They're also available at www.sprint.com click Accessories. Buying the right batteries and accessories is the best way to ensure they're genuine and safe.
- In order to avoid damage, charge the battery only in temperatures that range from 32° F to 113° F (0° C to 45° C).
- Don't use the battery charger in direct sunlight or in high humidity areas, such as the bathroom.
- Never dispose of the battery by incineration.
- Keep the metal contacts on top of the battery clean.
- Don't attempt to disassemble or short-circuit the battery.
- The battery may need recharging if it has not been used for a long period of time.
- It's best to replace the battery when it no longer provides acceptable performance. It can be recharged hundreds of times before it needs replacing.
- Don't store the battery in high temperature areas for long periods of time. It's best to follow these storage rules:
 - Less than one month: -4° F to 140° F (-20° C to 60° C)

■ More than one month: -4° F to 113° F (-20° C to 45° C)

Disposal of Lithium Ion (Li-Ion) Batteries

Do not handle a damaged or leaking Li-lon battery as you can be burned.

For safe disposal options of your Li-lon batteries, contact your nearest Sprint authorized service center.

Special Note: Be sure to dispose of your battery properly. In some areas, the disposal of batteries in household or business trash may be prohibited.

Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Understanding How Your Phone Operates

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radio frequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watt to 0.2 watt in digital mode.

Knowing Radio Frequency Safety

The design of your phone complies with updated NCRP standards described below.

In 1991–92, the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) and the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) joined in updating ANSI's 1982 standard for safety levels with respect to human exposure to RF signals. More than 120

scientists, engineers and physicians from universities, government health agencies and industries developed this updated standard after reviewing the available body of research. In 1993, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) adopted this updated standard in a regulation. In August 1996, the FCC adopted hybrid standard consisting of the existing ANSI/IEEE standard and the guidelines published by the National Council of Radiation Protection and Measurements (NCRP).

Body-Worn Operation

To maintain compliance with FCC RF exposure guidelines, if you wear a handset on your body, use a Sprint-supplied or Sprint-approved carrying case, holster or other body-worn accessory. If you do not use a body-worn accessory, ensure the antenna is at least 7/16 inch (1.5 centimeters) from your body when transmitting. Use of non-Sprint-approved accessories may violate FCC RF exposure guidelines.

Specific Absorption Rates (SAR) for Wireless Phones

The SAR value corresponds to the relative amount of RF energy absorbed into the head of a user of a wireless handset.

The SAR value of a phone is the result of an extensive testing, measuring and calculation process. It does not represent how much RF the phone emits. All phone models are tested at their

highest value in strict laboratory settings. But when in operation, the SAR of a phone can be substantially less than the level reported to the FCC. This is because of a variety of factors including its proximity to a base station antenna, phone design and other factors. What is important to remember is that each phone meets strict federal guidelines. Variations in SARs do not represent a variation in safety.

All phones must meet the federal standard, which incorporates a substantial margin of safety. As stated above, variations in SAR values between different model phones do not mean variations in safety. SAR values at or below the federal standard of 1.6 W/kg are considered safe for use by the public.
